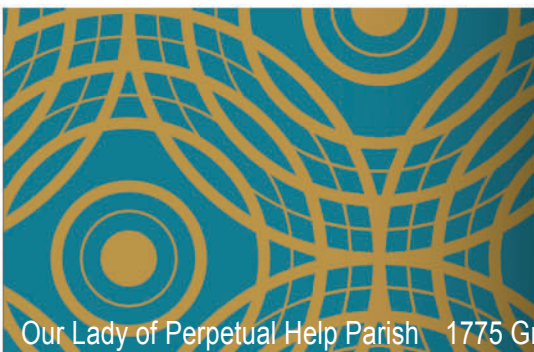
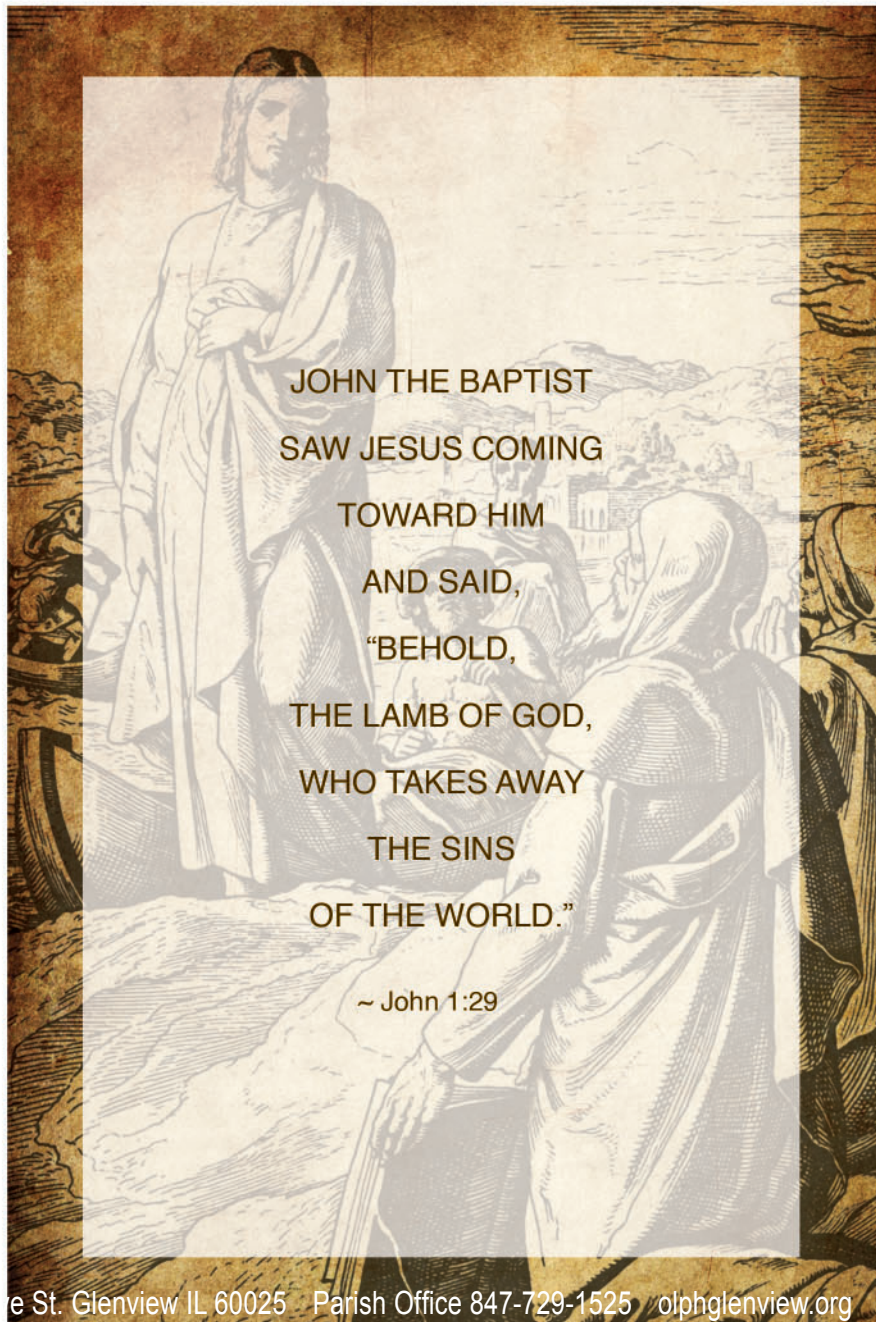

Thoughts on the Sunday Scriptures

As the prophet Isaiah proclaims in the first reading, the Lord continues to remind us that we are his servants. Imagine the Lord speaking these words to you personally:

"You are my servant. Through you I show my glory. I formed you as my servant from your mother's womb. I will make you a light so that you may shine the light of my salvation everywhere you go, and reveal my glory to everyone you encounter. I will give you the strength to do this. I will give you confidence. Heed my words, for I have spoken to you."

What would your response be to the Lord? Would it be different from the response you give the Lord now?

Dear Parishioners,

One of the powerful images in Pope Francis' encyclical, *Laudato Si'* is the Holy Father's characterization that we have become a "throw away culture". This is an attitude that permeates everything from how we deal with garbage, to our feelings about the environment, to our feelings about life itself.

Each day if we took the food that is thrown out we could substantially reduce famine and starvation that plagues the world. If we instituted basic recycling principles, we would substantially reduce carbon emissions and waste dumps. If we encouraged more solidarity with the causes of migration and the refugee exodus we would relieve untold suffering.

I am always struck by a sense of starkness that surrounds us as we head closer into the heart of winter. Things can appear in sharper contrast. There are some events that occur that can be seen more bluntly. We are finishing up Migration Week, we will be celebrating the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and we will soon be acknowledging the 43rd anniversary of Roe vs. Wade. All of these commemorations can challenge us to look at the painful and sinful consequences of being a "throw away culture."

As the annual commemoration of Migration Week draws to a close, we are challenged to reflect on the plight of immigrants, the undocumented, the political refugees who have so few people wishing to stand with them. The Pope has invited us to reflect on the Holy Family who were political refugees. The underlying causes of chronic poverty and persecution cause such unmitigated suffering and result in rage and desperation.

Dr. King's birthday recalls the ever present challenge to confront racism and bigotry that reduce the dignity and respect that every human

person has a right to. Every life is sacred, every child has a right to an education, every person has a right to equal opportunity in employment and housing.

The anniversary of Roe vs. Wade is the most profound indictment on a throw away culture. Even life itself becomes a victim of the greed, materialism and self-centeredness of the culture. It is not only the unborn, but the elderly, the chronically ill that become victims of this attitude.

Our parish has some initiatives that you might consider getting involved in. Our Creation Care Ministry wants to form specific proposals to make our parish more "green" especially in terms of recycling. Tom Hart and Kay Golden are helping us to prepare and sponsor a Syrian Refugee Family through the Catholic Charities Refugee Resettlement Program. On Jan. 19th our Respect Life Ministry is sponsoring a 24-hour Adoration Vigil for Life in the Lady Chapel.

The issues that contribute to a "throw away" culture are complex on many levels but there are things we can do to become more informed and to do what we can.

As we prepare for the inauguration of our 45th President, Donald Trump, we must join in prayer for him, his family and all newly elected officials. May we become a "more perfect union."

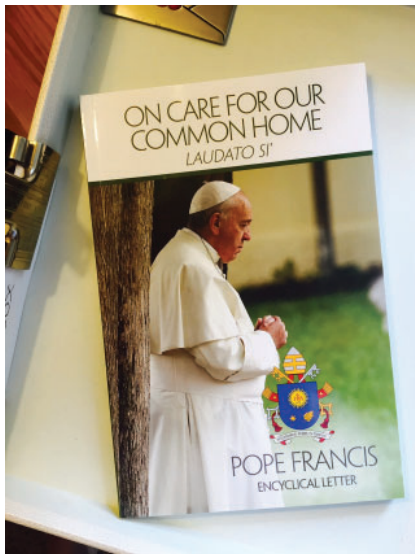

Creation Care Ministry Update

The Creation Care Ministry is looking forward to 2017 with some new initiatives in mind for our Parish that we hope that you will be as excited about as we are. Along with you, we want to live the message of Pope Francis in his encyclical, *Laudato Si'*, here at OLPH. In 2017 our primary focus will be to change OLPH into a Recycling Parish on the campus, at our events and in our homes. Stay tuned for more information!

As we start the New Year, here are some simple ideas that we all can incorporate into our daily lives. See if you can start with one or two and work up to all that apply to you and your family as you move on through the year:

10 Ways You Can Make a Difference:

Be Energy Efficient

1. During the summer months, close your curtains to block heat from the sun. During the winter, open your curtains during the day to allow the sun to warm your home. These simple steps can significantly reduce the need for air conditioning and heating, which are likely the most energy-intensive aspects of your home.
2. Calculate your carbon footprint. Understanding which activities are carbon-intensive allows you to know where you can take action. The EPA has a free carbon footprint calculator you can use. <https://www3.epa.gov/carbon-footprint-calculator/>
3. Adjust the thermostat. Turning down your air conditioning or heating when you leave the house will further shrink your carbon footprint. A change of just 5 degrees is a good start.
4. Adjust your driving routine. By combining multiple errands into one trip, you reduce the amount of fossil fuel you use.
5. Go meatless on Fridays. Livestock production accounts for 4% of Americans' greenhouse gas, according to the EPA. By going meatless one day per week, you'll both honor Catholic teaching and better care for Creation.
6. Recycle More. Recycling reduces your carbon footprint both because landfills emit greenhouse gases through decomposition, and because manufacturing from scratch is carbon-intensive. Find where and how to recycle almost anything in your area at search.earth911.com.
7. Use less water. Water processing accounts for approximately 3% of energy use in the United States, according to the EPA. Saving water means saving energy. Post a "please conserve water" sign at sinks and showers, install low-flow spigots, or select the "eco" setting on laundry machines and dishwashers.
8. Petition policy makers. Your elected officials have the power to take action on climate change. Write policy makers to tell them that you stand for the stewardship of creation.
9. Write to your local newspaper. Writing a letter to the editor has effects beyond your local community. Legislators assign their staffs to read letters to the editor as an important barometer of constituents' interests. For tip sheets and templates, write to programs@catholicclimatecovenant.org
10. Join a study or action group at church. We are all strengthened when we act together as a community and visit CatholicClimateCovenant.org for more information.

European Art in the Age of Shakespeare

Tuesday, January 31 at 7:00 pm

Art historian Jeff Mishur returns to OLPH on Tuesday, January 31 from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. in McDonnell Hall.

ABOUT THE TOPIC: The year 2016 marked 400 years since the death of Shakespeare (1564-1616.) Mr. Mishur will focus on a selection of art created during Shakespeare's lifetime which represents one of the most exciting periods in the history of art, a period when accepted Renaissance practices gave way to radical Baroque innovations.

This was also a period when the Church, still a major sponsor of artistic efforts, promoted the use of Counterreformation themes in order to catechize to people who were illiterate and offer a response to the challenges of the Protestant Reformation movements occurring in Europe. During this time, there was a central connection between art and the changing religious climate. Artists to be discussed include Caravaggio, Frans Hals, Rubens and Tintoretto.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER: Jeff Mishur and his wife Michelle Paluch Mishur co-own Art Excursions, a local company offering private tours to museums and architectural sites in Chicago and other U.S. cities.

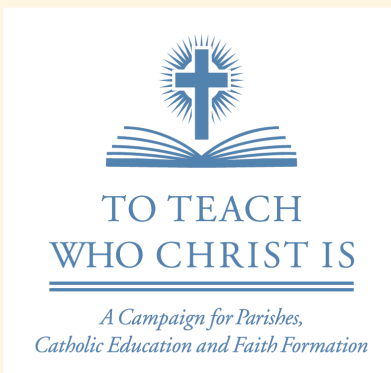
