

SUNDAY SCRIPTURES

We are at the doorsteps of Holy Week where we remember Christ's passion. Jesus humbled himself and let go of everything, emptying himself for us.

During this time of Lent, how have we joined the Lord? Has our prayer, penitential practices and almsgiving moved us to humble ourselves before the Lord? Have we let go of things that keep us from being authentic stewards for Christ Jesus?

How have we "emptied" ourselves so that when we do approach the table of the Lord, we can be nourished by His body and blood? As disciples of Christ and stewards of His gift of faith, it is time to evaluate our lives under the cross.

Dear Parishioners,

Recently there was a remarkable exhibition at the Chicago Cultural Center entitled, "Procession: The Art of Norman Lewis". Lewis was an African American painter who was intrigued by the role processions have played in our culture from a religious and political point of view. There are processions that inspire, others that enrage and others that transform. His paintings range from a mystical procession on Holy Saturday Night, to a KKK torch lit procession in the middle of the night, to a procession of hope as people seek to reclaim their neighborhood from gangs and violence.

This is a week of processions that reflect that kind of drama. We begin this weekend with the solemn procession of palms as we recall Jesus' triumphant entrance to Jerusalem. We will hear again about the torch lit procession of soldiers that apprehended him in the Garden of Gethsemane. We will remember the horror of Jesus' procession as a condemned criminal along the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem on his way to Golgotha. We will begin to feel the astonishment of those disciples who processed to his tomb on Easter Sunday.

We can read about these ritual movements and there is power in that. The blessing of this week is to enter more personally into these profound moments. Please consider experiencing the liturgies of this solemn week. There are few things more powerful than the Eucharistic Procession that ends the Holy Thursday liturgy, the procession to seven churches led by Fr. Lara that evening; to remember the procession that led to Our Lord's crucifixion and the procession of light into our darkened church as the Paschal Candle is lit on Holy Saturday.

This is a week like no other and is the centerpiece of our life together.

There are many people to pray for now. I ask your willingness to remember our candidates who we will be receiving into our faith community this Holy Saturday.

We have 16 candidates. We have been featuring them, and their faith journeys, in recent issues of the bulletin. They are a remarkable group. You can't help but feel the energy of faith and new life when you are with them. They will bring so much new life to our faith community. I can't wait to receive them on Holy Saturday.

This Lent has been a procession of encountering Our Lord's profound grace. I am aware that for many of you, sin has been confronted, the heavy cross of suffering has been relieved. Others have come to a deeper awareness of the Lord's workings in their lives. For many of us, our spiritual life has been deepened. Easter marks a new moment, but the procession to even deeper insight hastens us to find new ways to grow closer to Christ.

Next Sunday we will witness a blessed procession of many to celebrate Easter. Families will be re-united. Old friends and neighbors will join us. Please reach out and invite a neighbor or someone who hasn't been to Church in a while to come to OLPH! We want to open our doors to anyone who wants to celebrate this most sacred feast, the Resurrection of Our Lord and Savior. We will make room for everyone. There are many who attribute attending an Easter Mass to the occasion that led them to reconsider returning to more active participation in the Church.

Liz and Lowell Wallace will represent our parish at the Chrism Mass this coming Tuesday at Holy Name Cathedral. They will receive the newly blessed oils we will use in the coming year when infants are baptized, the sick are anointed and our young people are confirmed.



Often, it's uncomfortable to discuss finances. It's especially challenging when the news is not positive, and requires asking for increased support. This is the current situation relative to our parish operating expenses and General Offertory. While generous contributions to the *To Teach Who Christ Is Campaign* stirs in us much gratitude and allows us to invest in critical building and grounds improvements, our collections are falling short and in jeopardy of not meeting day-to-day expenses. The General Offertory (Sunday and Holy Day collections) is our single, largest source of income. It is vital to our efforts. During this Easter season, as we draw closer to fiscal year-end, please reflect on your blessings and prayerfully consider a sacrificial gift to the General Offertory. All registered parishioners received a special Easter mailing; including our pastor's message, the Holy Week schedule, and an Easter envelope. Thank you for reflecting on what keeps you coming back to Our Lady of Perpetual Help and how you can support our parish mission.

PARISH GIVING SUMMARY



The General Offertory is down \$28,638, or 1.4%, compared to the same period last year. Year-to-date collections are lagging our parish operating budget by 7.2%, or \$153,079.



Holy Saturday Blessing of Easter Foods April 15 at 11:30 a.m.

We invite you to join in Swieconka, the Slavic Easter celebration. In this service, foods traditionally eaten for breakfast on Easter Sunday are blessed. Choose your favorite basket and fill it with:

Eggs - a symbol of new life and the resurrected Christ

Ham - an acknowledgement of the New Law, putting aside the Old Law which forbade the eating of pork

Lamb - made of butter or cake dough, symbolizing Christ as the Sacrificial Lamb

Horseradish - a reminder of Christ's suffering and the bitter herbs offered Him on the cross

Salt - symbolizing wisdom needed in our daily lives

Bread - the essence of nourishment for our bodies and the appearance under which Christ is present

The blessing will take place in church on Saturday, April 15, the day before Easter.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is the process by which adults of other faith traditions, or of no faith tradition at all, come to join the Catholic church. People interested in RCIA attend a series of sessions, usually beginning in the fall, where they learn Catholic doctrine and become familiar with Catholic tradition. Seventeen RCIA Candidates have been preparing to join the Church. Over the next several weeks, their journeys of faith will be shared. Please join us in prayer as the candidates, and their catechists, make final preparations for the Easter Vigil.

Last May, I moved to Glenview with my wife, Meghan and our daughter Molly. We decided to join the OLPH parish to meet people and join a bigger community in our new neighborhood. 

It was this feeling that encouraged me to join RCIA and to continue my own journey of faith, but more importantly, forge a new pathway for my children to grow and learn from.

My name is Nilofur but many of my friends call me Nelli. I was raised in a conservative Catholic home with Filipino traditions. I remember doing the rosary every night as a child watching my mother take out her rosary beads motioning for us to gather near the altar. When I was younger, I never questioned my faith or had anyone ever question it. It wasn't until seventh grade when a friend asked me why we 'worshipped' the Virgin Mary and how it was wrong to do so. Before that moment, I felt secure in my faith and secure in who I was as a Catholic. I felt disgraced when I couldn't give her a proper answer and couldn't get her to understand. From then on I began to try and divert all sorts of conversations from my faith to other things that I felt I understood more.

From middle school throughout high school, I was ashamed that I didn't know much about my religion or who I was as a Catholic despite having read the Bible and attending CCD. I felt that I should have known more about what I claimed to be.

It must have been divine intervention when I decided to go to the school that was my last resort even though I had been accepted to my number one school. While, in college, I met people who were comfortable with their faith and beliefs despite being questioned. I decided that I should learn about what my faith was about and took religion classes. Still I did not feel like I understood enough. It took me many years to finally take the step to join RCIA. Ever since I joined, I have learned so much more about the church and about myself as a Catholic. It is an incredible experience to witness the journey of my fellow RCIA members and to see the work the Holy Spirit has done in my life since joining.

I'm so excited to be nearing the culmination of my RCIA experience. I grew up in Houston, TX, and was raised Episcopalian. My parents took us to church every Sunday and I was involved in Sunday school and youth group. I moved to New York City for college and attended a Presbyterian church. As I began my career as a magazine editor, I neglected church and looked for fulfillment in professional accomplishments. But ultimately, I wasn't satisfied and I



was still looking for a spiritual home. I met my husband, Mike, in New York in January of 2014 and he was such a blessing in my life. Since Mike is a cradle Catholic, we decided to

get married in the Catholic Church. We participated in Catholic marriage prep, which was led by some awesome, faith-filled Catholic couples. I was so inspired by the leaders' shared faith, I decided that I wanted to pursue conversion so that Mike and I could spur each other on in our faith. 

EVOLVE Presents: Rabbi Evan Moffic offering a dialogue about the Jewishness of Jesus Wednesday, April 26 at 7:30 p.m. in McDonnell Hall

Rabbi Moffic will speak about his recent book, *What Every Christian Should Know About the Jewishness of Jesus: A new Way of Seeing the Most Influential Rabbi*

Christianity, as a religious movement, did not exist in the lifetime of Jesus. It was after his death and the experience of his resurrection that his followers kept alive an oral tradition that later contributed to the writings of the gospels in the years 70-90 A.D. The spread of the Christian message was due in large part to the missionary preaching and writings of St. Paul who brought Jesus' message to the gentile communities that formed the basis of the early Christian churches.

Jesus lived and died as a Jew. Understanding the Jewishness of Jesus is the secret to knowing him better and understanding his message in the twenty-first century. Walking through Jesus' life from birth to death, Rabbi Moffic serves as a tour guide to give Christians a new way to look at familiar teachings and practices that are rooted in the Jewish faith and can illuminate our lives today. Among the critically acclaimed highlights of this book, Rabbi Moffic:

- Gives fresh insight on how Jesus' contemporaries understood him
- Explores how Jesus Jewishness shaped him
- Offers a compelling new perspective on the Lord's Prayer

Rabbi Moffic, of course, looks at the teachings and life of Jesus through the eyes of his own faith tradition; not the eyes of Christian theologians who were responsible over the centuries for developing Christological doctrine. He does this with deep respect and his intent is not to be controversial but to discover under-appreciated relationships between Jesus, Christianity and Judaism. In learning about this subject matter, Rabbi Moffic has spoken at many Christian churches and learned much from dialogue with many Christian religious leaders.

Evan Moffic is a Rabbi of the historic Congregation Solel in Highland Park, Illinois. He was ordained by the seminary of Reform Judaism, the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati in 2006. He first joined us in 2013 when he helped break open the Passover Seder. In 2015, he offered insight into "Jewish Influences in the New Testament". It is a gift to learn more about both traditions from this learned speaker.
