

Thoughts on the

### SUNDAY SCRIPTURES

As today's gospel reveals, the first meal shared with the risen Lord happened in a place called Emmaus. Perhaps there is no better time to reflect on this story than in those prayerful moments at Mass when we return to our place after receiving Holy Communion.

Those few moments give us an opportunity to reflect on our stewardship of Christ's presence within us. We have a chance to practice hospitality by inviting Jesus into our hearts to walk and talk with us about our own Emmaus journey.

We can relive once again the time when he broke bread for the disciples. And just as they did, we too can recognize Christ in this meal we have just shared with others.

The robins have been back for some weeks. Our days have grown longer and warmer, and we step outdoors into a landscape that has turned lush and green and is peppered with tulips. Nature has come out of its winter slumber, and seems to be making up for lost time. Members of a family of rabbits that live around the rectory now scamper regularly past my office window, making their presence known even as I write these words.

Spring is the season of new life in all its glorious freshness and innocence – a time of beauty and romance, when poetic hearts are stirred and musicians take up their bows. But, as allergy sufferers know all too well, it is also the season of pollen. And in this, I think, we learn an important lesson. Beauty can be irritating to those who are not disposed to receive it. In other words, our ability to enjoy the world in a meaningful way and to allow its beauty to transform us – to live fully, as the Fathers would say – requires that we first tend to anything that poses an obstacle to that fullness of life.

Grateful for the age in which we live, the allergy sufferer need only step into his or her local drugstore to find an adequate remedy, but, on a spiritual level, the resistance can be deeper and its solution found only after a period of honest introspection. The Lent through which we have just journeyed was intended as a time of renewal and reconciliation in which we strived to sweep the dust from our hearts and again put ourselves into right relationship with God. Ideally, we used that time wisely.

But, what if we didn't? What if work, or family obligations, or other things prevented us from having the Lent we desired? What if some problem or anxiety still weighs upon us and prevents us from surrendering fully to the joy of Easter in the same way the allergy sufferer is prevented from attending a spring picnic?

Here, perhaps, the words of a fourth-century paschal homily of St. John Chrysostom provide comfort:

*First and last alike, receive your reward; rich and poor rejoice together! Sober and slothful, celebrate the day! You who have kept the fast and you that have not, rejoice today for the table is richly laden! Let no one grieve over his poverty for the universal kingdom has been revealed. Let no one mourn that he has fallen again and again; for forgiveness has risen from the grave.*

The theme, of course, is that God is greater and stronger than we are, that sin has lost its power, and that death is destroyed. Our daily sins and failures, our slothfulness, our pride, our self-absorption – all these have their remedy in the empty tomb and in the new life that flows from it.

To live life in all its magnificent fullness, the mature Christian must realize only one thing. The fact that Christ has conquered the power of sin is not some kind of perverse license to now wallow in a sinful lifestyle. Rather, it is the event that gives us the courage and the freedom to say no to sin in all its forms. Bathed in the light of the resurrection, we see an entirely new dimension to life, one defined by infinite love. That love gives us the strength to take off our old selves and put on the new.

Growth into Life in Christ is a process that often takes a lifetime. Day in and day out, we strive and we struggle. But Christ has won the victory, and that victory becomes ours in baptism. To the extent that we live out our baptismal promises, we allow the medicine to work and our lives to be transformed by the beauty of God that surrounds us.

If we refuse to live those promises, well, it's all watery eyes and sneezes.

May the peace of the Risen Lord continue to be yours.

### Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist

Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist (EME) distribute communion at Masses demonstrating that the liturgy belongs to the community. They are graced with the privilege of sharing Christ's body and blood with others. As one of our ministers so beautifully explained,

*"Watching hundreds of people, of all ages and stations in life, line up to receive Holy Communion is a truly moving experience. I look into each person's eyes so we can share the moment when he/she receives the body or blood of Christ. In that shared glance, I have seen pain, joy, hopefulness, resignation, wonder, sadness, and sometimes even uncertainty, but behind all of those emotions is faith. That faith joins us in a very strong spiritual bond. It feels like a 'we know' moment, and it is very powerful. I often feel tears in my eyes at the privilege of sharing this experience with other believers."*

This ministry is for those who wish to share their Eucharistic faith with the members of the assembly. The best EMEs have the ability to communicate their faith through eye contact and gesture. Group training is scheduled periodically and announced in the bulletin. Individual training is also available. 

This is a mother's sad reflection on the present state of her relationship with her fourteen-year-old son. We all know that our children are safe as long as they are open with their parents, but in the teen years they often go to their friends rather than to their parents with their troubles and worries. There are certain things we say or do which cause them to say to themselves: "That is the last time I will open my heart to my parent." What are the destructive things we say or do, and how can we counteract them? Can we remain the most attractive people for our sons and daughters to open their hearts to us?

This is the question that the first part of Parent Effectiveness Training tackles. It not only analyzes, but also trains us in a set of skills that will have a very powerful effect on our relationships with our sons and daughters. The course begins on Wednesday, May 3, from 6:30 – 9:00 p.m and meets in the Flavin Room in OLPH Rectory. Application forms are available in the rectory office. Fr. CATHOLIC CHARITIES OF THE ARCHDIOCESE OF CHICAGO

### New Hope Apartments

Catholic Charities New Hope Apartments program is designed to end the cycle of homelessness by providing rapid rehousing with intensive case management services for homeless families with children under the age of 18. Through individualized service plans, clients focus on barriers to self-sufficiency, and work to increase income, decrease debt, and increase self-determination skills during their time in the program.

OLPH supports three families through Catholic Charities' New Hope Apartments Program, moving families from homelessness into self-sufficiency. OLPH pays the rent for two families, and shares the rent for a third family with St. Philip the Apostle and St. Catherine Laboure.

#### **Project New Hope Family: OLPH 1 (code name: France)**

This family joined the program a few months ago and consists of a separated Mom and a one-year-old boy. Our Mom is an African woman, originally from France who has been in the US for 10 years. Mom is currently going through a divorce due to domestic violence. Her husband is not permitted to see the baby unless supervised. Our Mom works nights in customer service selling wellness products for a company based in France. She and her sisters maintain the products' website. She works from home so that she does not have to pay for childcare. Our Mom is working very hard. She is motivated to work hard and save, and she is very resourceful.

#### **Goals:**

- Save six month's rent
- Continue to work with Life Span on her immigration status
- Follow through with the divorce and order of protection
- Continue domestic violence counseling

*This mom is very happy to be a part of this extended family with the Parishioners.*

#### **Project New Hope Family: OLPH 2 (code name: Botswana)**

This family was referred from Aid for Women in Des Plaines. Our mom is a married, 44-year-old African female with two boys; ages 19 months and 5 years old. She became homeless due to domestic violence and low income status. Our Mom is doing well! She finished her CNA course and passed her exam. She was able to leave her job in the laundry at a rehab facility and get a new job paying \$3.50 more an hour in her field at another nursing home, where she has been working for about a month. The job is demanding and at times it is very hard on her body. However, she still wants to return to the Women's Program at Harper College in the fall and study to be a nurse, if she can figure out how to manage childcare. Our Mom is still working hard on her goals, and is on target with everything. Her children are doing well!

#### **Goals:**

- Save at least three month's rent
- Build credit by paying credit card monthly
- Follow up with child support
- Meet a friend for support (another single mom)
- Continue education

#### **Project New Hope Family: Shared (code name: Tennessee)**

*Shared by St. Catherine Laboure, St. Philip the Apostle, and OLPH*

This family consists of a married female, in the process of seeking a divorce, with three sons, ages 18, 15 and 14; and one daughter, age 11.



Mom has been separated from her husband for a while due to his drug addiction. Our Mom reports that she first became homeless in 2014 when she was illegally evicted from her apartment in Illinois. As a result, she relocated to Tennessee to be with her family. She had a difficult time managing financially in Tennessee. In addition, one of her sons has a learning disability and the schools in Tennessee did not provide the support he needed. Our Mom decided to return to Illinois, but was not able to afford housing on an ongoing basis after her return.

Our Mom is doing well. She was transferred to a Skokie restaurant as a manager. Her oldest son has decided to attend Oakton Community College where he will get a free ride! His mother is very excited. He plans to attend Oakton for his first two years then transfer to a four-year college. Our Mom's 14 year old son has been having some problems in middle school. He has been in treatment and on medication. Our Mom is grateful to have found a psychiatrist, in Evanston, who accepts her insurance. This helps tremendously as they travelled far to see his prior physician. Mom changed her work schedule to nights to accommodate possible calls from school and to launch the family's day in the morning. Mom hopes to buy a car, when she saves enough and receives her tax refund, so her oldest son can assist in driving his siblings to and from school. This plan will save on the bus fare she is paying now. She also has identified potential housing near her home.

#### **Goals:**

- Save at least three month's rent
- Work on improving credit report
- Secure current apartment to renew lease
- Save at least 90% of IRS refund
