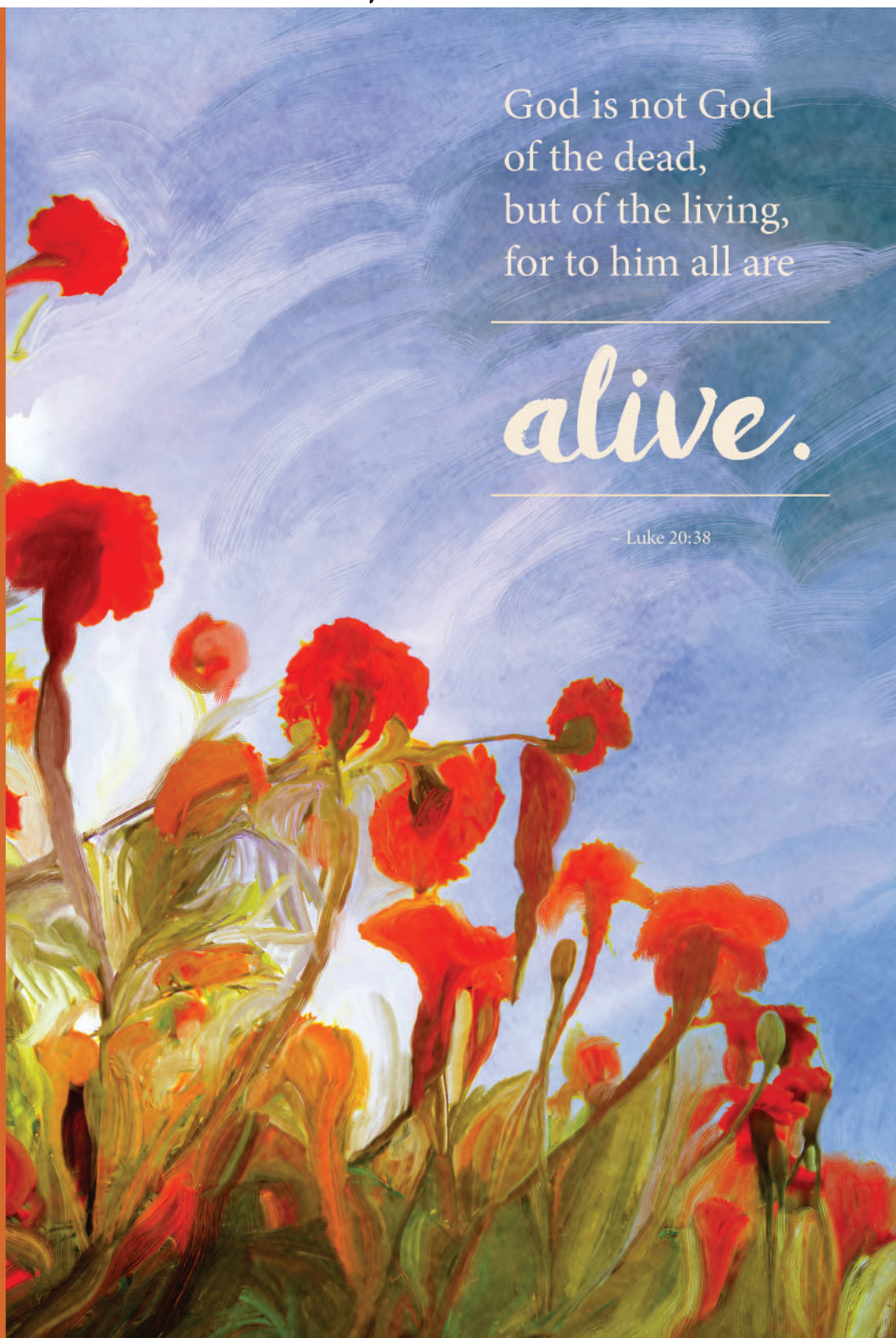
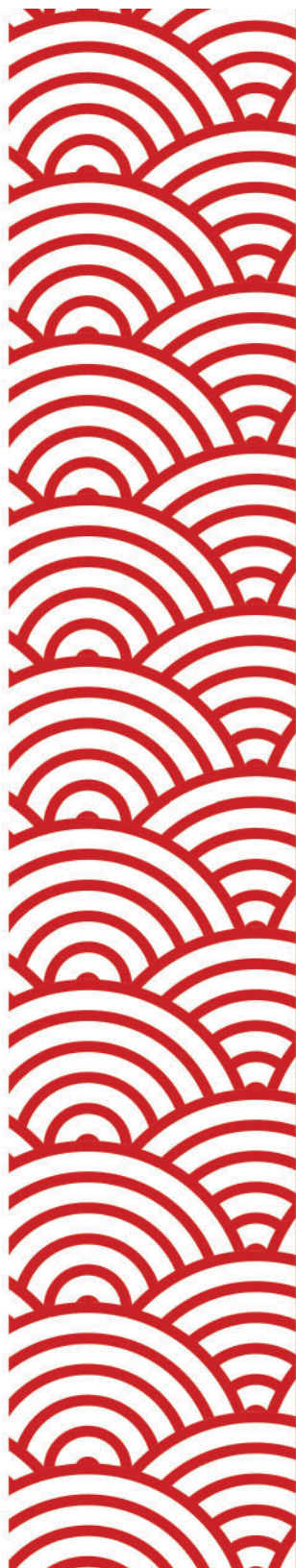

Thoughts on Today's Gospel

In today's second reading, Saint Paul offers encouragement to the Christian community and prays that the Lord instill encouragement in their hearts. There is nothing worse than discouragement to drain people spiritually and emotionally. Yet, at times, it is much easier to lose patience with others and offer critical and discouraging words. We are "our brothers' (and sisters') keepers." We are stewards of our relationships with others. Offering encouragement is essential to the exercise of that stewardship. Saint Paul understood that God worked through him just as God works through us to encourage others. How often do we ask the Lord for encouragement? How often do we look for opportunities to affirm, strengthen and encourage others in our daily lives?

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Dear Parishioners,

The month of November is a time dedicated each year to the remembrance of our beloved dead. Please visit the shrine in the south vestibule. If there is an image of someone you would like included, please feel free to add it. The shrine will be up until November 30. There are also Books of Remembrance in which you can enter the names of your deceased relatives and friends.

Let us pray in a special way for families in the parish who have experienced the death of a loved one this past year. The grieving process is different for each one of us. Maybe you could reach out to someone you know who is grieving.

I am especially mindful this weekend of our Bereavement Ministry that is so present to families as they prepare a funeral. We are so blessed by their ministry.

I am often asked what the position of the Church is in regards to cremation. This practice is becoming more common. Just last week the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine and Faith issued a document entitled, "Ad Resurgendum Cum Christo," To Rise with Christ. The document includes regulations and instructions regarding the decision to be cremated.

The Church acknowledges that cremation is becoming more common. The Church's history of opposing cremation was based on the decision of those who saw it as an act of denying the Christian belief in the resurrection. The Church does not see evidence of that belief now. The document calls for reverence of the remains, as we would the body. The Church instructs that the "cremains" should be interred in a cemetery. The document forbids the practice of scattering ashes, keeping the cremated remains at home or wearing the cremated ashes in lockets. If you would like to read the document, it is available at; vatican.va. The priests are available to discuss any of your concerns.

This week our nation will elect a new president as well as many other candidates. The ability to vote is a sacred privilege we enjoy as the result of a right that has been defended by lives of many men and women in military service. John Carr, a prominent theologian at Georgetown recently acknowledged that many Catholics are experiencing a "political homelessness" as neither candidate nor the platforms of their parties are consonant with Catholic social or moral teaching. Never the less we must continue the process of moral persuasion and building a sense of the common good that is rooted in a conviction that human life is sacred, from the moment of conception until death. There is a prayer in the bulletin you may want to say before you vote.

Our capital campaign, "To Teach Who Christ Is," marks leadership weekend. Please consider participating! All of us will benefit in some way by the projects of the campaign. The broader the base of those who are participating the more engaged we will be as a parish. Thanks to all those who have already committed. We are over 2 million dollars!

Congratulations to Guild 36 for an awesome Trunk or Treat celebration last week. What a success! Also, congratulations to Esther Behnke a devoted member of our Project Linus Ministry. Two of her beautiful quilts are being featured at the Fine Art of Fiber Show at the Chicago Botanical Gardens. Project Linus provides handmade washable blankets for needy infants and children. Recently some of their quilts made it to Haiti to give comfort to those in need.

Religious Education Update

Leaves and pumpkins and heavier sweaters! No matter what the temperature outside your front door – or how you feel about candy corn – fall is here. With it we're reminded of the nature of seasons and change – and God's faithfulness through it all. Fall is upon us and with it, a wonderful reminder of the goodness of our God. The world around us will continue to be full of color and abundance with the fullness of life. We can enjoy on our tables the fruits of a bountiful harvest while marveling at the transformation of the world around us. Take a moment to stop and absorb the wonder of it all.

As the RE year continues in full swing, this past week the children in the RE program had the opportunity to participate in a Parade of Saints. The children were invited to come dressed as their favorite saints and share a couple of facts about the one they had chosen. Getting the children to dress as saints and do a little research gives them an opportunity to learn more about our Church and its rich history.

During class each week, the catechists explore ways for the children to grow closer to God. One

way we may grow closer to Him is by praying the Rosary. October is the Month traditionally dedicated to the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary. What peace the Rosary brings. Remembering the mysteries of Christ's life and Our Lady's life, we repeat Hail Mary after Hail Mary. Indeed, the mysteries of the Holy Rosary- joyful, sorrowful, glorious and luminous- are the mysteries of our own lives as well. The children are taught that as they pray the Rosary, they too will be drawn closer to God. The children share that they recall seeing parents and grandparents so often praying their rosaries or "talking to their beads," as some referred to this devotion. We remember as well that for many saints, the Rosary was an indispensable part of their daily prayer.

Our children are also reminders of the goodness of God. They are so full of life and joy and talents, ready to transform the world. Each of them is special, and I feel blessed to be part of their lives as they move through the grades of our Religious Education Program. It is my hope and prayer that we adults may be models for our children on what it means to be followers of Jesus.

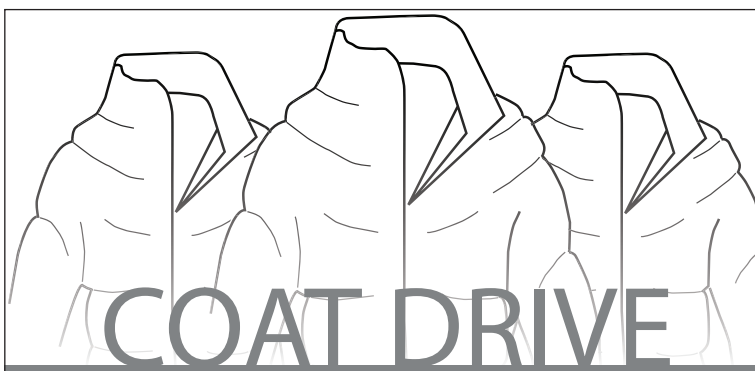

Election 2016: Weigh Your Conscience Before Casting Your Ballot



The general election on November 8 offers Illinois residents the opportunity to vote for candidates for U.S. president, Congress, and the state legislature.

The Catholic Church is nonpartisan, and does not endorse candidates nor tell parishioners which candidates they should elect. The Church does offer guidance for discernment as parishioners make their decisions on how to vote with a properly formed conscience.

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops has updated its document, *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, which may be found at www.usccb.org/issues-and-action/faithful-citizenship/index.cfm.

The Catholic Conference of Illinois encourages you to carefully review the seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching listed below as you consider candidates. More information may be found at www.ilcatholic.org.

Seven Key Themes of Catholic Social Teaching*

Life and Dignity of the Human Person

Human life is sacred, and the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society and of Catholic social teaching. Abortion, physician-assisted suicide, cloning, embryonic stem cell research and racism are evils to be guarded against and opposed. Our promotion of human dignity and life also moves us to work for an end to war and the death penalty.

Care for God's Creation

We are called to protect the planet, living in relationship with all of God's creation. Pope Francis underscores the importance of our stewardship of the Earth in his encyclical *Laudato Si': On Care for Our Common Home*. In it, he poses a key question: "What kind of world do we want to leave to those who come after us, to children who are now growing up?"

Protection of & Participation in the Family & the Community

Social and economic policies affect our ability to grow in community. Marriage and the family are the central social institutions that must be supported. Pope Francis stresses the significance of the family in *Amoris Laetitia* (The Joy of Love), observing that marriage and the family are the central social institutions that must be supported by the state.

Rights of the Person Protected, & Each Person's Responsibilities Met

Human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Every person has a fundamental right to life and to those things required for human decency, including food, water, shelter, employment and health care. As citizens, we all have duties to one another, our families and society.

Care for the Poor and Vulnerable

While the common good embraces all, those in greatest need deserve our preferential concerns. A moral test for society is how we treat the weakest among us, including children, the disabled, refugees, the elderly, the unemployed, the poor and the marginalized.

Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers

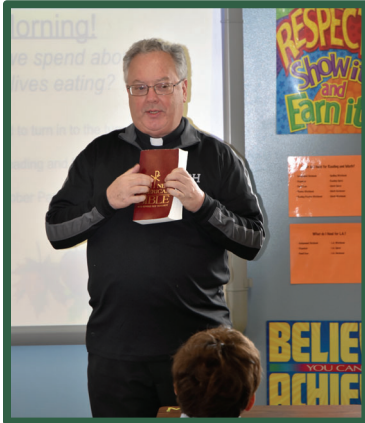
The economy must serve people, not the other way around. Work is a form of continuing participation in God's creation. Workers must have basic rights to decent work, fair wages, workplace safety, collective bargaining, private property and economic initiative.

Solidarity

We are one human family whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. We are our brothers and sisters keepers. We work to create unity through dialogue and a civil discourse that is respectful of others.
