“With our eyes on Christ we can do unbelievable things.”

The story of Jesus’ walking on the water is found in three of the Gospels – Matthew, Mark, and John – but Matthew is the only one to include the story of Peter’s walking on the water to meet Jesus.

The disciples are out on the lake very early in the morning (between 3:00 and 6:00 am) struggling against the stormy sea. Isn’t that the time we awake when our problems are overwhelming us, and we feel like we are drowning in our fears?

Jesus speaks comforting words to the frightened disciples, coming to them on the sea: “Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid.” The whole gospel is wrapped up in such reassurance. But the heart of the incident for Matthew is the interchange with Peter and his walking, sinking, and rescue. Somehow Peter knows that whatever Jesus commands, Jesus makes possible. The commands of Jesus, taken seriously, create miracles.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer’s analysis of Peter’s response is worth citing. “Peter had to leave the ship and risk his life on the sea, in order to learn both his own weakness and the almighty power of his Lord. If Peter had not taken the risk he would never have learned the meaning of faith... The road to faith passes through obedience to the call of Jesus. Unless a definite step is demanded, the call vanishes into thin air, and if people imagine they can follow Jesus without taking this step, they are deluding themselves.”

This passage is not the story of a skeptic who habitually doubts, but the story of a faithful follower who, overwhelmed by the circumstances surrounding him, begins to lose his nerve when he discovers the odds stacked against him. From Jesus, Peter finds a steadying and delivering hand.

We have heard Peter’s story so many times that we jump to the ending. We remember as a reproach

the words of Jesus after he saved the drowning man, “O you of little faith.” But wait. Go back. Look. See those stunning moments when Peter stood on his own. One like us actually did walk on water. Isn’t that remarkable? And if such a feat has been done once, it certainly can be done again. With our eyes on Christ we can do unbelievable things. And when, as it is likely, we tumble, we’ll find his saving hand grasping ours as Peter did. Maybe we need to understand Jesus’ question kiddingly: Why were you so worried, Peter, with me as your lifeguard?

We should also note that Jesus ends up in the boat with the disciples. A ship was one of the earliest symbols of Christianity, and this story indicates why it was attractive: when surrounded by diversity, safety and salvation are experienced in the church with Jesus in its midst. We all need to be in the same boat.

Some of us may bail, or work our way to the other side, or try to hold the boat together. Some of us whistle and sing to scare away our fear and doubt. Some give pep talks. But none of these options will get us to shore. So perhaps we should leave walking on water to Jesus. The ship which is the church is where we want to be. It can provide the way for us to get to other places, so that as disciples of the Son of God we can move throughout the land proclaiming the wonders God has done for us.

Building & Grounds Update

Summer Projects Underway

As I shared in the June 19 bulletin, the Building and Grounds Committee set an ambitious task list for this summer. Let’s check in on the various projects.

> **Renovate the rectory kitchen.** This project was completed in July. The fifty-six year old kitchen received a total face lift with new cabinets and countertops, new appliances, new lighting and a fresh coat of paint. Asbestos in the old linoleum necessitated the replacement of the tile floor as well.

> **Paint the exterior of three buildings.** This project is currently underway. The painting crew is working on the convent, Monticello and Mt. Vernon buildings.

> **Replace the roof of the Carrolton Building.** This project was completed in July. The building adjacent to Glenview Road had been leaking seriously during the past year.

> **Replace the boilers in the Playdium.** This project is currently underway. In March and April we had a number of costly repairs to the old boilers. The Building and Grounds Committee decided that now is the time to replace them. The savings in heating costs over the next few years will be significant.

As you can imagine, the costs involved in these important and needed projects adds up. Your generosity to the General Offertory is what allows us to keep our buildings in good shape. Each year our Finance Council budgets carefully and sets aside a percentage of our annual income for needed repairs. Thanks to their wisdom and hard work, we have been able to undertake these improvements without the assistance of a special appeal.

A parent asked me recently what the word "Kairos" means. In Greek there are two words for "time". There is first of all "chronos" which is the time measured by the sun, the time on your watch. The word we use comes from St. Mark's Gospel: After John was arrested Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God and saying: the time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe in the good news.

We pray that our young people will receive the power of God's Holy Spirit on this retreat from their ordinary lives.
