Dear Parishioners,
“For by grace you have been saved through faith.”

These words, taken from this weekend’s second reading, are intended to give us hope and encouragement. Indeed as St. Paul writes, *“God is rich in mercy”*.

There is a different tone to the readings and prayers this weekend. Tradition calls this Fourth Sunday, *Laetare Sunday*. The word comes

from the Latin *laetare*, meaning *to rejoice*. The ancient Introit for this Sunday states, *“Rejoice, O Jerusalem: and come together all that love her: rejoice with joy”*. We have now passed the midpoint of our Lenten journey; Easter is within sight.

The priests can wear rose colored vestments; flowers may adorn the altar this Sunday. Today, traditions abound with a relaxation of the rigors of Lent. In earlier times servants were given this afternoon off to visit their mothers. In fact, in many European countries today is Mother’s Day.

We are marking this *Laetare Sunday* with a focus on our parish almsgiving; an organization called NPH (Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos). NPH was founded by Fr. William Wasson in 1954. Today it’s a network of homes and programs for abandoned, disadvantaged and at-risk children in nine countries in Latin America and the Caribbean. I hope you have enjoyed reading the bulletin articles written by our parishioner, Chuck Allworth, who serves as the Midwest Region Director for NPH USA.

There are 12 young people from the NPH home in Guatemala staying with parishioners and sharing their joy, hope and faith with our community.

You can’t help but feel this joy as they will be singing at all our Masses. Saturday night we will have a fiesta in McDonnell Hall. They will be visiting many of our parish programs to tell us their story. They had a wonderful time this past Tuesday visiting with the children in our school and religious education programs. *Beinvenidos!*

I want to extend a special welcome to Fr. Ron Hicks who will be preaching at most of the Masses. Fr. Hicks served as the priest chaplain for an NPH home for several years and is currently the Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Chicago. *Beinvenidos Padre Ron!*

We have sent our Emergency Operations Plan to be reviewed by Cook County and the Archdiocese. It will

be a great help as we will be much better prepared to face the challenges of an emergency. I’d like to share two safety issues:

Last summer, we experimented with diagonal parking on Church Street to make it easier for handicapped and disabled parishioners to enter the Church. The Village had concerns that the parking slots were not deep enough and we consulted with engineers who came up with a plan to meet the village’s concerns. After reviewing the plan, the Village decided against permitting diagonal parking on residential streets. We cannot alter the current parking situation. We will now designate most parking spaces behind the Lafayette Building and Rectory for handicapped parking during weekend Masses. Thank you for your patience.

I am very concerned about a proposal to park freight trains in Glenview to expand the number of passenger trains between Chicago and Milwaukee. This plan would install a switching station at Dewes Street and includes a two-mile holding track for freight trains to stand for up to eight hours. There would be tankers and potential hazardous materials sitting right here in a densely populated community. I have safety concerns because of the proximity of these freight trains to our school, Glenbrook South and several other schools as well as the many neighborhoods that would be affected if something happened. Our parishioner, Chuck Balling, has been involved in encouraging residents to express their concerns. There is a public forum on this issue coming up March 12 at 7:00 pm at Glenbrook South High School auditorium. It’s a great opportunity to express your concerns.

The Myles McDonnell Basketball Classic and Roundball Tournament is off and running with several great games already. I can’t believe I didn’t make the cut! Our coaches are high school students from Glenbrook and Loyola and they are terrific! Special thanks to Fr. Kartje who gave a great talk last Sunday on Faith and Science. This Sunday, Sr. Rosemary from Misericordia, will speak at 3:00 pm in McDonnell Hall. She is an extraordinary witness to the sanctity of human life. Don’t forget the St. Patrick’s party next Saturday!

Since 1954, Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (Spanish for Our Little Brothers and Sisters) has been caring for orphans. NPH is a unique network of orphanage homes and outreach programs in nine countries throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. Founded by an American priest, the organization is dedicated to improving the lives of orphaned, abandoned and at-risk children and young adults by delivering unconditional love, comprehensive healthcare and a quality education. The goal is to help these young people overcome the poverty and abandonment into which they were born and develop them into productive citizens who become leaders in their own communities.

Approximately 3,200 youths call an NPH home their home. Since its founding, NPH has provided loving and stable homes to over 20,000 children. NPH outreach programs served more than 100,000 people in 2017.

Worshipping with us and helping to provide our liturgical music at Masses this weekend are thirteen young people and their chaperones from NPH Guatemala. They have been staying with host families within OLPH Parish since March 6. We hope that their time with us this weekend and during the previous weeks, and learning about them in a series of bulletin articles have helped make your Lenten observation more meaningful; more pure and undefiled.

Although their stay in our parish concludes March 19, our Lenten journey continues. Please continue to include the young people of NPH in your Lenten prayers. Consider fasting in their name. Fulfill your Lenten almsgiving observation by offering your financial support to them at our second collection this weekend and through the almsgiving bags that have been distributed (extra bags are still available at church entrances).



Seven Churches Visitation

On Holy Thursday, after the Mass of the Lord's Supper, there is a very beautiful and ancient tradition of visiting seven churches. Each church will have an Altar of Repose of the Blessed Sacrament, so while the rest of the world goes to sleep, Catholic pilgrims will be traveling late into the night, keeping Jesus company on the eve of his Crucifixion. At OLPH, the Blessed Sacrament will be taken on a procession through the Church and be reposed in a beautifully adorned Tabernacle. This is a time for intense prayer and devotion in the presence of the Most Holy Sacrament.

Join us Holy Thursday, March 29, for the visitation of seven churches around Chicago. We will leave, by bus, soon after the Mass of the Lord's Supper at OLPH, which is at 7:00 pm. We will visit seven churches in the Archdiocese of Chicago in which we will pray with Jesus and contemplate the mysteries of our faith. We will conclude our journey back at OLPH around midnight. His topic is "Praying the Our Father Again for the First Time" This is based on his new book: *To Dare the Our Father: A Transformative Spiritual Practice*.

When we are happy or when we are sad, when we eagerly wait for a child to be born, or silently stay as an elder dies, when we hear of a plane going down or attend a church going up, when we stroll alone in the woods or gather together in liturgy or assembly, when we are filled with gratitude or emptied by grief, when we are driven to praise or dragged to repent, we reach for the Our Father. It is a prayer we know; the words are memorized and familiar. But there may be more to it than we suspect.

We will explore how the prayer invites us into an alternative consciousness, into a different way of thinking, feeling, willing and acting.


Spirituality and Skill: Two Necessary Steps in Loving

In 1981 I was in Seattle, training to be a PET instructor. I thought I'd mastered the skill of confronting others fairly well, but there were times I just wanted to go for the jugular, and throw all my skills out the window. I asked the teacher, Bud Upshaw, what to do when my anger makes it impossible to confront respectfully. He looked at me and said with a smile, "That is your department, Paddy!" By this he meant that we need God to come and melt our hearts when we feel so hostile towards another. This applies even to our beloved children.

So, we certainly must pray and pray, and completely grow in our love of the Lord. But, while keeping step with this growth in love of the Lord, we need to learn some most important skills, if we wish to enhance our relationships. As a teacher of these skills, my hope is that we can help others to keep a life-long love relationship with their children, alive and vibrant.

Therese Pompei Cabrera

My name is Therese Cabrera. I'm a resident of Glenview and an OLPH parishioner. My faith journey began when I was little. I was born and raised in the Philippines, and was baptized a Catholic. I attended Catholic school since preschool, which influenced me to learn my first prayer, more about God, love, family, my environment, and my culture. Growing up Catholic, I could not say that I have that "perfect" faith in God. There were challenges in my life that brought me to question God's love, and made it harder for me to embrace my faith. I had migrated to the United States seven years ago where I had to start my life from scratch. Ordination Banns

Most of us are familiar with Wedding Banns appearing in our parish bulletin as couples prepare to celebrate the Sacrament of Marriage. Less common but just as necessary is the appearance of Ordination Banns. Whenever a parish is blessed to have a candidate for Holy Orders being presented for ordination as a deacon, the local parish is to publish the customary Ordination Banns for three consecutive weekends prior to the ordination date in the parish bulletin. These Banns are meant as a public announcement (fulfills CIC 1051 §2) to help assure that no impediments to Orders or other situations that could hamper one's ministry or cause scandal to the Church exist.
