

Thoughts on the Sunday Scriptures

In today's second reading, Timothy is issued a strong directive:

"Bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God." For the early Christians this could mean torture and execution. For most Christians today, enduring hardship for the gospel might include accepting ridicule or mockery, or the suggestion that we lack sophistication. Nevertheless, in his letters, Saint Paul is adamant that we should not be ashamed of being followers of Christ.

Good stewards are not ashamed of their allegiance to Christ. They do not hide their faith. Reflect on this question: Are you willing to speak about following Christ Jesus no matter who your listeners happen to be?

Dear Parishioners,

"Lord it is good to be here!" Peter's response to the Transfiguration in this weekend's gospel reveals the power of being in the right place at the right time. Lent is an invitation to open our eyes and hearts to those moments when we have this overwhelming sense of how good it is to be where we are.

Being with your grandchildren, an evening out with close friends, feeling better after a long period of illness, feeling a heavy cross has been lifted; all are moments when we get a sense of what Peter was feeling as Jesus, Moses and Elijah were all in his presence.

I have been blessed recently with that feeling of "Lord it is good to be here". I felt it when I had the chance to hear many of our 8th grade religious education students share their experiences of service in preparation for their Confirmations next Sunday. I heard such awesome things like folding clothes for the residents at Misericordia, packing boxes of much-needed food for Feed My Starving Children, getting to know kids at Blessed Sacrament and helping in the Sharing Room. The collective difference these kids have made, and the hours of service they offered, is remarkable.

I felt that feeling while witnessing many hearing-impaired parishioners' reactions to the hearing loop. Some were in tears, hearing Mass for the first time in our Church. I am so grateful to Jean Draths, John Bernauer and Al Landauer who first suggested this technology to me. I'm also grateful to the family of Loretta Garvey who made this enhancement possible here at OL, with a gift to the Capital Campaign in Loretta's memory. (We will be adjusting the system to respond to feedback.)

I felt that feeling while participating in our parish mission last week with St. Catherine Laboure and St. Norbert parishes as we were guided by Wayne Messmer. The community of St. Catherine made us all feel so welcome. Wayne's meditation of how he dealt with being a victim of senseless gun violence – and came within one centimeter of being killed –

was riveting. His faith, and the healing he experienced through the intercession of St. Peter Damien, were deeply moving.

Another app to consider for your Lenten journey comes from Bellarmine Retreat House; www.pray.jesuitretreat.org. Fr. Mike Sparough SJ gives many of the reflections.

This past week, Mike Hrvojevic became our Director of Facilities and Operations. Mike has been our chief engineer. He brings a wealth of experience and will help better centralize and organize our efforts to be as efficient and effective in maintaining our beautiful campus. We are a large operation with hundreds of people here on any given day of the week. Congratulations Mike!

I was grateful to witness the Rite of Election at Holy Name Cathedral last Sunday as our catechumens became candidates for the Easter Sacraments. We have one of the largest groups with 17 candidates!

Happy Saint Patrick's Day to all! My brother Mike was the Special Guest of Honor at the St. Patrick's Day Parade downtown. Our parishioner, and President of St. Patrick High School, Dr. Joseph Schmidt, is the Grand Marshal for the Northside Irish Parade. Congratulations! Cardinal Cupich has granted a dispensation for all those celebrating this coming Friday.

GOD PRESENTED AN OPPORTUNITY One Parish Pastoral Council Member's Experience

My name is Julie Ruchniewicz and I had the privilege of serving on the Parish Pastoral Council from 2012 to 2016, including one year as Chairperson.

It is said that God will supply us with the opportunity, but it is up to us to do something with it. I have belonged to Our Lady of Perpetual Help parish for over 40 years and have served in a variety of roles in several ministries and the school. I was open to the idea of working on something new. I noticed an invitation to apply for the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) in the bulletin, scanned the information and set it aside. I happened to mention it to a Women's Club member whose husband was the current PPC Chair. He called me and shared the incredible passion for his role. God had supplied me with an amazing opportunity. What would I do with it?

The more than 40 parish ministries at OL are organized into five communities by common mission. Council members represent and communicate the needs of these ministries to the PPC. The first year I served as one of the Parish Council liaisons to the Human Concerns Community that includes Ministry of Care, Ministry of Praise and Little by Little (just to name a few). The members of our church that are called to serve in these ministries are so compassionate and I appreciated how they are doing God's work in our midst.

Later, I served as Chair of PPC. While serving as chairperson, we onboarded our wonderful current Pastor, Father Jerry Boland. It was an honor to be part of the process of welcoming and orienting him to our amazing parish and all that we accomplish. I witnessed his resilience, as he persevered thru the first days back to school and religious education, his first Holly Fair and his first Christmas Eve Mass. Being on the pulse of what is happening at OLPH and working with Father Boland, along with the rest of the council for that year, was one of the most fulfilling experiences I have had as a parishioner.

Being involved in Parish Council allowed me to meet people I otherwise would never have met, learn things about our parish I didn't know and be blessed to work together for a common purpose. Our mission statement says that we are "a family of believers in Christ who strive to live according to his teachings". I feel so proud of OLPH and connected to that mission statement because I had the pleasure to serve on Parish Council. Maybe God is supplying you with an opportunity?



What is the OLPH Parish Pastoral Council?

The OLPH Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is made up of 15 "at large" parishioners and our Pastor, Fr. Boland. The purpose of the Council is to:

- listen to, identify, and examine the needs, ideas, and hopes of our community
- develop, encourage and communicate with the ministries and continually assess the quality of life of the parish faith community
- create a "culture of involvement", embracing and welcoming the faith community, and encouraging the development of leaders
- envision the future; formulate, implement, and monitor goals of our parish as we strive to fulfill the Church's teachings

Meetings follow an agenda and members work together in a supportive, advisory role to Father Boland to accomplish on-going, present, and future issues, projects and goals for the parish. The PPC meets on the third Monday of every month throughout the year. Members serve a three-year term.

Theologian Jack Shea: *The Woman at the Well Meets the man Born Blind and Lazarus*

Saturday, March 25, 9:30 a.m. in McDonnell Hall

During this Lenten season, we will read three long stories from the Gospel of John; The Woman at the Well, The Man Born Blind, and The Raising of Lazarus, on March 19, 26 and April 2, respectively. Join Us for Prayer Tasting



All of us have a "hunger" for prayer and for a deeper relationship with God. But for a myriad of reasons a consistent, regular prayer life seems elusive for many of us. Join Fr. Tom Hickey in the Lady Chapel in church on three consecutive Wednesday evenings during Lent. Each evening will begin promptly at 7:00 p.m. and conclude at 8:00 p.m.

Over the three evenings, Fr. Hickey will talk about how to develop a stronger spiritual life as well as discuss some of the common pitfalls we experience in prayer. A Survivor's Story



Get me to the Church on Time

When I was young, "getting to the church on time" meant being in church before the Offertory of the Mass. After the Offertory, you were late, and that was a mortal sin. But if I got to church any time after the beginning of Mass up to the Offertory, that was only a venial sin.

Now, when I am talking to young people, this legalistic language will get me nowhere. The language of sanctions cuts no ice in the present age. We now think in terms of a personal invitation by a loving God. God invites each of us to be present at the very act of Jesus giving his life, because of his absolute love. We are truly present as Jesus says to us, "take and eat."

This is an invitation to raise each of

us to a higher level of love. Just as we are changed when we are present at a work of great art, or when we read great literature, so being with Jesus at the Sacrifice of the Mass raises each of us to a higher level of love.

But as a people, as members of the very family of Jesus, we feel inadequate. In the presence of our all-loving God, we are conscious of the areas of lovelessness in our own lives. And so, our very first act as we gather, is to acknowledge this. We, as a people have sinned. We want to turn back and live unselfish lives as Jesus has shown us by his life and ultimately by his death on the cross. It is this love that we are celebrating in our liturgy. We as a people say out loud that we

have sinned. But we want to change. We want to disown any nastiness in our lives. We start the process of pleading with God to make us more loving every day of our lives.


I am making this special plea to parents. Young people so often have a sense of victimhood. Each week we try to get them to acknowledge that they too hurt each other. They can bully. They often gossip. They may make harsh judgments, etc. It is most important that they start as early as possible admitting that they sin, and pleading to God to give them a loving heart. Please make sure that we are all present at this most important part of our Sunday Eucharist.
