seek, share, rejoice - pastor's letter

Dear Parishioners,

Tuesday, March 27 is the Chrism Mass at Holy Name Cathedral. It is a beautiful liturgy in which the Cardinal consecrates the oils that will be used to anoint the sick, the catechumens, the newly confirmed, the newly baptized and the newly ordained priests and bishops. It is the one time a year that a priest should celebrate with their bishop.

At the Chrism Mass the priests renew the promises they made at their ordination.

We begin the day with prayer, a reflection by the Cardinal and have our confessions heard. As I prepare each year for the Chrism Mass, I often find myself reflecting on my priesthood.

I could have never anticipated the challenges and changes that I have experienced in my 37 years of priesthood. I have been a part of extraordinary moments of healing and new life. I also have been devastated by the unrelenting scourge of the clergy sex abuse scandal.

I have been blessed by my priestly assignments. I have served as a priest at St. James in Arlington Heights, Mary, Seat of Wisdom in Park Ridge, Holy Cross in Deerfield, and Holy Family in Chicago. I served for 25 years in the priest personnel department and priestly formation under Cardinals Bernardin and George.

I am blessed to be here at OLPH. I know I speak for all the priests here, when I say how deeply grateful we all are for your support, encouragement and faith. As a priest, I can't tell you how much it means to be around you and experience your witness to the presence of Christ in your lives. The vitality of this parish is profound.

Around here, one could get lulled into thinking that the priest shortage is a myth. We have four full-time priests. In addition to our responsibilities here, we each take two days a week where we are on call at Glenbrook Hospital. We say Mass and attend to the sacramental needs at the Abington, Maryhaven and Chestnut Square communities. We also minister when needed at Lutheran General, Emerald Place, Journey Care, Glenview Terrace and Skokie Hospital.

We are so grateful for the beautiful home you provide for us. I just love the priests here; they are inspiring to me. Fr Lara, Fr. Kostyk and Fr. Paddy Tyrrell are awesome priests. I very much appreciate Fr. Hickey, Fr. Flavin, Fr. Thinnes, Fr. McGrath and Fr. Kartje.

While we are blessed with many priests, changes are sweeping the Archdiocese. The median age for priests is 68. I am still a member of the younger clergy! One-third of the parishes have only one priest. In other cases, several parishes are sharing just one priest.

With the demands and challenges facing priesthood, I saw firsthand what can happen when a priest isn't taking care of himself. While the priest who never takes a day off, never goes on vacation, never goes on retreat may seem heroic, he may usually crash and burn, or become extremely isolated. Some people become preoccupied when a priest is away; where is he, why is he not here? I thought you might be interested in some of the policies in place to help ensure the spiritual and mental well-being of priests.

Canon Law requires a priest to go on retreat each year. I have been on a cycle of retreats focused on Franciscan Spirituality. Priests are entitled to a day off that should include an overnight. We are entitled to four weeks of vacation and a week of continuing education. Every seven years a priest can apply for a sabbatical of up to six months. We are encouraged to have a spiritual director and have an annual physical. Can you imagine your doctor or attorney who never updated their knowledge or skills?

As diocesan priests, we are sometimes called secular priests, which means we do not live in a monastery, rather we live with the people we serve. While the days can be long, up at 5:00 am to prepare for the 6:30 Mass and can go to 10:30 pm with meetings, they are days that are rich, powerful and grace filled. I love being a priest! To be your pastor is a privilege I can't even begin to put in words.

Every Monday, the priests gather to pray the Divine Office together. At the forefront of our intentions are you, our beloved parishioners. We would be nothing without you! We have dinner together and catch up on all that has happened in the previous week.

As we approach the Chrism Mass, I praise God for the gift of the priesthood and the privilege to be in your midst. As priests, we need your support, wisdom and faith. Every priest who has served at this parish, has made friends for life. This parish has had such great priests who have ministered here. I humbly follow in their footsteps.

seek, share, rejoice - holy week

Nothing the Church does in her liturgy is without meaning. The sights, the sounds and even the smells of sacred worship collectively immerse us in something deeper – they draw us, through the avenues of our bodily senses, into a world where our internal attitudes and spiritual dispositions become tangible in the external language of sign and symbol.

During Advent, our longing sighs for the light of the world found expressed in a liturgy that was dark and muted. At Christmas, we rejoiced finally at the arrival of that light in the birth of God's Holy Word, and our liturgy became dazzlingly bright, robed in white and gold, and filled with the sweet fragrance of incense.

During this time of Lent, we fast. We deny ourselves in an effort to die to sin, as we together journey through an arid desert landscape. Accordingly, our liturgy is stripped almost completely bare. Flowers disappear and we use musical instruments far less. During this sacred time, the Church suppresses many external expressions of joy – the Gloria and the Alleluia, for example, both deliberately vanish – so that when these reappear in our Easter liturgies, they do so with a renewed freshness and deepened meaning.

As we move closer and closer to the Sacred Triduum, the highest holy days of our faith, our fast intensifies all the more.

For many centuries, the Gospel read on this Sunday, the fifth of Lent, was John 8:46-59. If you find the chance, pick up a bible and read this passage. The scene is one where the crowds become particularly angered at the claim of Jesus that He knows the Father and has existed since even before Abraham. It's an example of the kind of speech that was construed as unforgivably blasphemous and led others to clamor for the speaker's punishment and death. In fact, the ones who hear Jesus prepare to stone him; he escapes them only by "hiding himself" and running out of the temple.

It is from this action of Christ in the Gospel that the Church developed the practice of shrouding his image on this day: we hide Him, so to speak, as He hid Himself. Soon, this practice was extended to the images of saints as well, for the Church quickly recognized the value in incorporating our other bodily senses into the Lenten fast: making it a fast of the eyes as well as of the stomach.

Though we no longer hear this section of John on this day, the spiritual value of a visual fast remains. As such, many places maintain the laudable practice of veiled images from the Fifth Sunday of Lent until Holy Saturday. The altar crucifixes, statues, and icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help will remain veiled until the time of the Easter Vigil.

Eggs - a symbol of new life and the resurrected Christ

Ham - an acknowledgement of the New Law, putting aside the Old Law which forbade the eating of pork

Lamb - made of butter or cake dough, symbolizing Christ as the Sacrificial Lamb

Horseradish - a reminder of Christ's suffering and the bitter herbs offered Him on the cross

Salt - symbolizing wisdom needed in our daily lives

Bread - the essence of nourishment for our bodies and the appearance under which Christ is present

My name is Brian Blockovich. I have been a parishioner at OLPH for 18 years. My mother came from a large Irish Catholic family and my father was an altar boy. When my parents had me in the late 60's, they had grown apart from the Church. They left the decision of my spiritual direction up to me. Being a young child, I did not know any better and considered my upbringing quite normal and enjoyable. What it means to be Catholic really did not come into focus until after I was married and my father passed away. Since I was not baptized, I received a dispensation from the Church to be married and we took a vow to raise our kids in the Catholic faith. Two years after we were married and a month after the birth of my oldest son, my dad died of a heart attack. He was 57. That was a very traumatic period of my life. In dealing with that pain and trying to be there for my mother, the Church and faith in God helped me survive and kept me going in a positive direction for myself and my young family. With the addition of three more kids and a couple mortgages later, raising our kids in the Catholic tradition has been a blessing to us. Unlike my experience in public school, I felt part of a larger community and knew at some point it would be my destiny to enter the RCIA program. After going through the program, I have felt blessed to meet so many wonderful people and gain a deeper understanding of what it means to be spiritual and closer to God. My journey has made me realize that God is truly closer to us than we are to ourselves.



Fred Carter

My name is Fred M. Carter III and I grew up on Long Island in New York. I was born into an Episcopal family and faith has always been a key component of my life. I attended St. Peters by the Sea Episcopal Grade School and, later, became involved in a youth group through high school. I attended Lehigh University where I met Chelsea. We dated for five years before we became engaged in my hometown. We are planning our wedding and will be married at OLPH in August. As I reflect on the past and look toward the life I would like to lead with Chelsea, I've decided to embark on our life journey together in the Catholic Church. 
John Sutehall

Seven Churches Visitation


