

Thoughts on the SUNDAY SCRIPTURES

In today's Gospel Jesus offers his parable about last chances. The fig tree will have one last chance to bear fruit before it is cut down and destroyed.

Good stewards realize that, like the fig tree, they are endowed with God-given gifts that are meant to "bear fruit" for God and neighbor. God has legitimate expectations of them.

They also realize they do not know how much time they have left before the gardener returns for an accounting of their fruitfulness.

How are we using our God-given gifts? How might we use our gifts to bear more fruit?

The answer requires some urgency.

Dear Parishioners,

Amazon has a way of knowing what you like. Buy enough of a thing, and the website produces a row of suggested items that relate to your earlier purchases. Use the site for a long enough time, and the suggestions become more finely tailored to your own interests and tastes. Avid procurer of esoteric theological volumes that I am, the Amazon algorithms have been long aware that I am an incurable bibliophile and often feed my hunger with some surprisingly good recommendations. To date, one of these stands out among the rest – a relatively recent novel by Eugene Vodolazkin simply titled *Laurus*.

It's the story of a young boy in a medieval Russian village being raised by his grandfather, the village herbalist and healer. As the novel begins, we encounter the two, boy and grandfather, living together in almost picturesque harmony. We watch as the boy learns how to read and is taught the science of healing at the knee of his grandfather – a wise and apparently holy man who regularly brings his grandson to the Divine Liturgy and other church services at a local monastery. We accompany the two as they journey daily through the woods alongside their cabin collecting herbs and wildflowers, all the while accompanied by a tame wolf they keep as a house pet. We see the grandfather, knowing his life will soon end, spend long hours recording his secret remedies in notes he plans to leave to the boy, now rapidly becoming a young man.

Upon the death of the old man, the boy is left alone and bereft, and takes to spending his days in the village cemetery. It is there, while weeping and praying at the grave of his grandfather, that he one day spots a tuft of red hair peeking out from behind one of the stones. Upon investigating further, he discovers the hair is attached to a young and very beautiful girl who has been ostracized by her family and neighbors because she shows symptoms of the deadly plague that has been decimating the countryside. Knowing he can help, the boy takes her back to the cabin where he washes and treats her wounds and uses the remedies of his grandfather to heal her underlying affliction.

The two fall in love, but into an immature love that is never allowed to fully bloom. The girl becomes an obsession for the boy who compulsively fears she might be taken from him. So, he hides her from the other villagers, pushing her into another room whenever a knock reverberates against the cabin door. Later, when the girl becomes pregnant and is kept from the assistance of a midwife, his possessiveness is shown to be deadly. Plunged into a grief more terrible than he has ever known, the boy's pain is compounded by the fear that she might be forever lost, for his beloved dies without the sacraments.

It is only the advice of a holy elder that gives a ray of hope: "...there is no *already* where she is now," he tells the boy. "And there is no *still*. And there is no time. But there is God's eternal mercy..." "But I took away her earthly life," the boy desperately responds. "So then give her your own," the elder replies. And it is with these words that the rest of the novel begins. As he grows into




Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

With this letter I write to you about a development that should disturb us greatly, both as citizens and as disciples of Jesus, the Lord of life.

Recently, two bills have been introduced in the Illinois House and Senate. The first, House Bill 2495 and Senate Bill 1942, both identical pieces of legislation, seeks to strip unborn persons of any protection – or even consideration – under the law and declare abortion to be a “fundamental right” and matter of health care. The end result is that an abortion could be obtained at any stage of pregnancy, including late term, for any reason and without any regulation. The law would no longer guarantee any modicum of humanity or compassion for any unborn person in Illinois, even if they are partially born. This legislation also repeals the Abortion Performance Refusal Act, which protects doctors, nurses and hospitals who refuse to permit, recommend, perform or assist in abortion. In so doing, rights of conscience, especially religious objections, will be lost.

The second piece of legislation House Bill 2467 and its identical Senate Bill 1594, repeals the Illinois Parental Notice of Abortion Act. This law, upheld unanimously by the Illinois Supreme Court just six years ago, has the common-sense purpose of ensuring that parents would be part of the life-altering decision of their minor child in the case she seeks an abortion. This effective law has reduced abortions performed on minors by fifty-seven percent.

As citizens of a state and people of faith who care about the common good, I urge you to join me and my brother bishops in an effort to defeat this radical departure from current law and practice in our state. Please reach out your State Representative and Senator to urge defeat of these bills. We welcome you to join us for weekly *Gathership* in McDonnell Hall following the 9:30 Masses on Sundays during Lent (except 4/7).




Youth Ministry

a man, we follow the boy on his journeys. We hear his prayers, witness his acts of penance and charity, and overhear his many internal conversations with his beloved. We see a love begun in youth and marked by immature self-interest grow into a real love molded by selflessness and sacrifice. In other words, we watch a human being, sanctified by the indwelling Trinity, give up his own life in the manner of Christ for the sake of the one he loves.

In some ways, the boy in *Laurus* is like the gardener in today's gospel. Captivated by the beauty of the fig tree, he is unable to destroy it without one last attempt to make it bloom. The mystery of love compels us to do all we can, give all we are, for the life of another – the one love tells me is now center of my life. Love is an ecstasy, an *ek-stasis*, precisely because it pulls me out of myself. God's love for us is what pulled him into creation, first as its source and creator and then as its redeemer. His obsession with his people is manifested most clearly in his faithfulness to us, just as the boy's love for the girl becomes tangible in his total gift of self for her sake, and the gardener's fondness for the fig tree becomes apparent in his perseverance to preserve it.

How, then, do we respond to this divine faithfulness? This is the question we should sit with throughout Lent. Do we take time, throughout our day, to recognize his love? Do we respond to his invitation and return it in kind? Are we as captivated by him, *mutatis mutandis*, as he is by us? Our God created us for himself, that we might partake eternally in the adventure of his love, and we cannot be either fully human or fully happy unless he is the center of our existence. The boy in *Laurus* discovered this light, and so lived into it more and more every day. His story would be a profitable read during this holy time.



Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos

Observing Lent in Unity with Orphaned, Abandoned and At-risk Children through Giving Alms

OLPH is directing its almsgiving efforts this year to benefit the children and young adults served by Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (Spanish for "Our Little Brothers and Sisters"), a unique network of orphanage homes and community outreach programs in Latin America and the Caribbean. **Young people from NPH Mexico will be staying with OLPH families for a good part of Lent, and will be joining us for our Masses on the weekend of March 30 and 31.**

NPH is dedicated to improving the lives of orphaned, abandoned and at-risk young people by delivering unconditional love, comprehensive healthcare and a quality education. The goal is to help them overcome the poverty into which they were born and to develop them into productive citizens who become leaders in their own communities.

The traditional Catholic pillars of observing Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Purposeful almsgiving is more than just philanthropy. It is giving to God. Therefore, it becomes a form of prayer. Since almsgiving is sacrificial giving, it becomes a form of fasting. In a very real sense, it can be said that almsgiving combines prayer and fasting together.

There's an old saying that holds that "charity begins at home." It is certainly true that we should be generous at home and in our local communities. However, charity can't and mustn't end at home. Our Catholic Church is not just OLPH; it is universal. Our family is God's family, and we are all brothers and sisters.

In the nine countries throughout Latin America and the Caribbean where Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos operates, governments happily refer orphaned, abandoned and at-risk children to NPH homes, but they don't provide any funding for them. Everything that NPH spends to support the young people it serves must be raised each and every year through fundraising efforts such as Lenten almsgiving and the special collection we will take up at Masses on the weekend of March 30 and 31.

Please be generous when you are asked to give alms this Lent. Make a difference in the lives of orphaned, abandoned and at-risk children in some of the poorest countries in our hemisphere. Special almsgiving bags have been distributed to children enrolled in the OLPH Religious Education program and to OLPH School students. Help reinforce the lessons your children are learning about giving alms. Additional bags have been placed just inside the entrances to OLPH Church. Please feel free to take a bag to use for giving alms. Thank you for your purposeful and sacrificial almsgiving.

My name is Julie Ruchniewicz and I had the privilege of serving on the Parish Pastoral Council from 2012 to 2016, including one year as Chairperson.

It is said that God will supply us with the opportunity, but it is up to us to do something with it. I have belonged to Our Lady of Perpetual Help parish for over 40 years and have served in a variety of roles in several ministries and the school. I was open to the idea of working on something new. Our mission statement says that we are "a family of believers in Christ who strive to live according to his teachings". I feel so proud of OLPH and connected to that mission statement because I had the pleasure to serve on Parish Council. Maybe God is supplying you with an opportunity?


