### SUNDAY SCRIPTURES

Jesus called to his friend from the dead, "Lazarus, come out!" It is the same call our Lord makes to us unceasingly: "Come out!"

Jesus calls us from our tomb of doubt and unbelief, from the darkness of our fear and anxieties; from the depths of our weaknesses and lack of hope. Christian stewards pray for an open heart, so that they may hear the voice of the Lord, heed the continuous call to come away from their former way of living and reprioritize their lives in the light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Do we believe Christ has the power to transform our lives? Do we take time to listen for his call?

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Dear Parishioners,

Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life: whoever believes in me, even if they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." This passage from the Gospel of John is proclaimed this weekend.

This says it all! The Lord, whom we love, invites us to eternal life. Our Lenten journey is centered on this fundamental declaration of the Lord. Beginning next weekend, we enter the most sacred week of the year. You will be receiving Holy Week schedules in the mail. Please make plans to join us. Bullying plagues young people in many places. The Holy Father asked the newly confirmed to confront bullying and to resist the temptation to mock, ridicule or threaten another person.

## Transformation: Living Christ's Mission Today

The heart of Parish Transformation lies in making a commitment to live Christ's Mission. To become missionary disciples, however, we must first understand the mission entrusted to us.

Jesus came into the world to bring salvation and the promise of eternal life. While he walked among us, He cured the sick with compassion, forgave the sinner with mercy, cared for the poor and the outcast with tenderness, and taught the essence of the law which is to love one another as He loves us. During Jesus's short time on earth, he embodied the Kingdom of God. In Romans 14:17, we learn that "the kingdom of God is not food and drink but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit." Pope Francis contends that the "kingdom is at once both gift and promise. It has already been given to us in Jesus, but it has yet to be realized in its fullness." When we pray to the Father, "Thy kingdom come," we acknowledge our mission to fulfill what Jesus began, to model our lives after Christ in order to bring God's Kingdom to fruition.



Before Jesus ascended to Heaven, He commissioned His apostles with the words, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe everything I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:18-20). Knowing how afraid they were at being left alone, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to fill them with the courage needed to spread His word even in the face of persecution. At Baptism and again at Confirmation, we are also filled with the Holy Spirit and commissioned to carry out Christ's Mission. As we go about the business of living, we are witnesses to our Faith by our words, but more so by our actions. Do we emulate and spread the joy of our faith in how we live? Are we reaching out to others with care, sharing our time, talent, and treasure?

Parishes that are vibrant, faith-filled communities have members who support one another and also reach out to the larger community to bring the light of Christ to others. As Jesus's disciples, we must be living examples of His compassion, mercy, tenderness, and love. One of the many ways our parish carries out Christ's mission is through the work of our Sharing Ministry and The Needy Family Fund. Fr. Ron Lewinsky, in his opening remarks in the Mission Workbook, proclaims that Transformation can be a "new Pentecost" for a parish. Let us build on the good work we already do. Let us go beyond our comfort zone as the apostles did. Filled with the fire of the Holy Spirit, let us spread the good news of God's Kingdom with its promise of salvation and eternal life.



## RCIA - faith journeys...

**The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults** (RCIA) is the process by which adults of other faith traditions, or of no faith tradition at all, come to join the Catholic church. People interested in RCIA attend a series of sessions, usually beginning in the fall, where they learn Catholic doctrine and become familiar with Catholic tradition. Seventeen RCIA Candidates have been preparing to join the Church. Over the next several weeks, their journeys of faith will be shared. ## Why are the Statues Veiled?

Nothing the Church does in her liturgy is without meaning. The sights, the sounds and even the smells of sacred worship collectively immerse us in something deeper – they draw us, through the avenues of our bodily senses, into a world where our internal attitudes and spiritual dispositions become tangible in the external language of sign and symbol.

During Advent, our longing sighs for the light of the world found expression in a liturgy that was dark and muted. At Christmas, we rejoiced finally at the arrival of that light in the birth of God's Holy Word, and our liturgy became

dazzlingly bright, robed in white and gold, and filled with the sweet fragrance of incense.

During this time of Lent, we fast. We deny ourselves in an effort to die to sin, as we together journey through an arid desert landscape. Accordingly, our liturgy is stripped almost completely bare. Flowers disappear and we use musical instruments far less. During this sacred time, the Church suppresses many external expressions of joy – the Gloria and the Alleluia, for example, both deliberately vanish – so that when these reappear in our Easter liturgies, they do so with a renewed freshness and deepened meaning.

As we move closer and closer to the Sacred Triduum, the highest holy days of our faith, our fast intensifies all the more.

For many centuries, the Gospel read on this Sunday, the fifth of Lent, was John 8:46-59. If you find the chance, pick up a bible and read this passage. The scene is one where the crowds become particularly angered at the claim of Jesus that He knows the Father and has existed since even before Abraham. It's an example of the

kind of speech that was construed as unforgivably blasphemous and led others to clamor for the speaker's punishment and death. In fact, the ones who hear Jesus prepare to stone him; he escapes them only by "hiding himself" and running out of the temple.

It is from this action of Christ in the Gospel that the Church developed the practice of shrouding his image on this day: we hide Him, so to speak, as He hid Himself. Soon, this practice was extended to the images of saints as well, for the Church quickly recognized the value in incorporating our other bodily senses into the Lenten fast: making it a fast of the eyes as well as of the stomach.

Though we no longer hear this section of John on this day, the spiritual value of a visual fast remains. As such, many places maintain the laudable practice of veiled images from the Fifth Sunday of Lent until Holy Saturday. The altar crucifixes, statues, and icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help will remain veiled until the time of the Easter Vigil.

**Eggs** - a symbol of new life and the resurrected Christ

**Ham** - an acknowledgement of the New Law, putting aside the Old Law which forbade the eating of pork

**Lamb** - made of butter or cake dough, symbolizing Christ as the Sacrificial Lamb

**Horseradish** - a reminder of Christ's suffering and the bitter herbs offered Him on the cross

**Salt** - symbolizing wisdom needed in our daily lives

**Bread** - the essence of nourishment for our bodies and the appearance under which Christ is present

The blessing will take place in church on Saturday, April 15, the day before Easter.


## Clean Your Bookshelves!
