

Or preferring uninterrupted hours playing the latest video games or watching TV to spending time in a bible study group, choir practice or serving in a soup kitchen? Or keeping late hours at work over sharing the gospel with friends and neighbors? To what extent do we exercise stewardship over our relationship with Christ?

Dear Parishioners,

*"Return to me with all your heart"*

Our Lenten journey is drawing us ever closer to Holy Week and Easter. The focus of the daily scriptures takes on a more ominous tone as Jesus approaches Jerusalem.

Lent reminds us that we can change, our lives can move in new directions as we contemplate this weekend's gospel of the woman caught in sin. Jesus never gives up on us. He never turns his back on us. He never stops believing in our capacity to confront the forces of evil and prevail against them.

For much of the past year the Church has been coming to terms with the evil of the sexual abuse of minors and the malfeasance of many in authority, especially bishops. This past week the Pope issued three major documents that put in place universal norms for all dioceses in the world.

Recently **Cardinal Cupich** gathered with representatives of the parishes in Vicariate 2. It can be quite a challenge keeping up with so many stories and vastly different places that dioceses in the world are at in dealing with the sexual abuse of minors.

The Cardinal reviewed the policies and procedures that have been in place, some as early as 1992. We have had a highly distinguished lay review board that makes recommendations to the Cardinal regarding any allegation of misconduct of a minor. The Archdiocese has a positive relationship with the State's Attorney to refer any allegations immediately to that office. The Archdiocese cooperates in whatever way necessary with the investigative process.

We have, as a diocese, adopted state of the art screening processes for any candidate for our seminary. We have ongoing education of the clergy on child safety concerns and the requirements of being mandated reporters.

No process is perfect, and we must be ever vigilant when it comes to the safety of children. Each situation has its own dynamics.

Every year there is an annual audit of all parishes by the Office for the Protection of Children and Youth. The audit reviews child protection policies and protocols. Every year, OLPH has been in conformity. This annual audit is about to begin.

Given how large our parish is and with a myriad of youth activities, this is quite an undertaking. **Laura Kearney, Amy Mills and Cherie Diceasare** oversee the process in which any adult that is involved with our youth has had a background check and has participated in an educational process called Virtus. I appreciate the willingness of adults to cooperate with these procedures to insure the safety of our children.

Vigilance is crucial, and I appreciate hearing from you if you have any concerns or questions. I can direct you to a resource person if I am not sure how to respond. Some concerns have resulted in a misunderstanding of a situation, other concerns have resulted in being more sensitive to the way one was interacting with a child. The Archdiocesan Office is always available for consultation. In the case of an incident, they will facilitate as quickly as possible, the protocols of who must be involved in an investigation. The police and DCFS make the determination as to whether the incident is a substantiated case of child endangerment.

I have been grateful for the many conversations that I have had with parishioners regarding this crisis. Communication is critical. The involvement of lay people on all levels is essential for a healthy Church and a safe environment for all our young people.

This Sunday, our eighth graders in Religious Education will be confirmed. They are an outstanding group. I recently had the privilege of interviewing several of them. I was so impressed by their

## Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos

### Observing Lent in Unity with Orphaned, Abandoned and At-risk Children through Prayer

In the Catholic Church, the season of Lent is observed through the three pillars of prayer, fasting and giving alms. This Lent, OLPH Parish has been practicing these pillars in unity with the young people cared for by NPH. Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (NPH, Spanish for "Our Little Brothers and Sisters"), is a unique network of orphanage homes and community outreach programs in Latin America and the Caribbean. NPH is dedicated to improving the lives of orphaned, abandoned and at-risk children by delivering unconditional love, comprehensive healthcare and a quality education.

Holy Week and Easter are fast approaching. Just like any big celebration, we must prepare ourselves for Christ's Passion and Resurrection, and we do that through observing the three Lenten pillars of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Are you ready? Have you prepared?

Prayer is part of everyday life at NPH Mexico. The young people who live there pray as a community before every meal. In their prayer, they give thanks for the food and for those bienhechores (which literally translates to "do gooders" in English) who help to make the meal possible through their financial support. Those do gooders are you. Through your Lenten almsgiving and your generosity in last weekend's second collection, you are helping to put food on the table at NPH Mexico.



Father Phil Cleary

The spiritual leader at NPH Mexico is Father Phil Cleary, a Chicago Archdiocesan priest. Father Phil first arrived at NPH Mexico in 1983 to volunteer for a summer. He liked it so much that he asked, and received, permission to stay, and he has been there

ever since. A true missionary priest, Father Phil is currently the full-time chaplain at NPH Mexico where he oversees the religious instruction and the sacramental and spiritual formation of over 700 children and young adults.

We've established the importance of prayer at NPH Mexico, and we've established that the orphaned, abandoned and at-risk children who live there are praying every day for their benefactors from all over the world. What about you? Can you pray for them right now? Just take a moment to think about orphaned and abandoned children who you have never met, who live thousands of miles away in a developing country, and who are praying for you every day in their NPH home. Ask God to bless them and to provide for them.

**Anna Farris**

My name is Anna Farris. I have been an OLPH parishioner for 7 years. I was baptized and grew up in the Catholic faith. My mother taught many of my religious education classes, and the priest from our small, rural parish was a family friend who oftentimes joined us at

family gatherings. Sadly, several events during my middle school and early high school years caused me to question my faith and beliefs. I decided not to go through with my confirmation and stopped attending church altogether. It wasn't until several years later that I found myself longing to come back to church. My husband, Ben, and I quietly started attending mass at different parishes as we moved around. We are so happy to have found a home at OLPH. Our three children attend school here, and we truly feel blessed to be part of such a wonderful and engaged community. It finally feels like the perfect time to formally continue my faith journey and receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. The RCIA candidates, team members, and Father Isaac have taught me so much and have inspired me with their faith. I look forward to continuing this spiritual journey and growing my faith in God each day.



**Clare McMahon**

I'm Clare McMahon and I was born and raised here on the North Shore. I don't really know when my journey of faith began. I think it is a journey we are all on throughout our lives. I was raised without any religious obligations and have always had a curiosity about religion and faith of all kinds. My

parents were both raised Catholic and so information about the Catholic church was the easiest for me to obtain from an early age. Through my childhood and early adulthood, I continued to investigate my faith and to learn about religions of all kinds. But I was always unwilling to commit to any single faith. It took personally trying times for me to seek God's comfort and to bring me to my willingness to commit to God and to a religious community. Although I have visited temples, mosques, churches, and synagogues of all kinds and still feel comfortable in many different houses of worship, when I was in need of God, I went to a Catholic church. When I approached the Catholic community and asked to be welcomed, I was welcomed. Part of my journey is the lesson that your path is not to be taken alone; we are supposed to travel with companions so that we may all come closer to God, together.



**Mark Szymczak**

My name is Mark Szymczak. As a child, I did not have an understanding of what it meant to be a follower of religious beliefs. My parents both came from a Catholic family, but had grown apart from the church and thus left the decision of faith up to me. I occasionally prayed for guidance

and had begun thinking more about the Catholic community through my fiancé, Lauren. Lauren grew up going to church weekly and now serves as a spiritual mentor. She encouraged me to explore and discover spirituality and religion by asking questions such as, "Why are we here?" Over time, I felt a greater pull towards the Catholic Church and became more open to attending Mass and learning about Jesus. The defining moment occurred one November Saturday at St. Alphonsus Church in Lincoln Park, where I was attending a friend's wedding. Unexpectedly, I experienced a strong compulsion to receive communion and sense of belonging in the Catholic Community. I asked God about it and received positive affirmation. This was the strength and courage I needed to take the next steps in my faith journey. I was ready to become Catholic and receive the sacraments.



**Ricardo Arturo Villamil**

My name is Ricardo Villamil, a born and raised resident of Glenview and a parishioner of OLPH. As a baptized cradle-Catholic, I always had a deep reverence for the Catholic Church, but my understanding of the true faith was weak. Throughout high-school, I didn't make time for God—the vanity of my

youth occupied all my energies; throughout college, I couldn't believe in God—the secularization of my education prevented me from having faith in anything but deism; throughout my post-college 20's, I didn't know how or where to find God. In short, I was not prepared to defend myself against the onslaught of demons aiming to corrupt my soul. But, a burning desire led me to rebel against the stupidity of my youth, a desire that ultimately culminated in my taking a year-long trip around the world. Traveling through Catholic countries—from Portugal to Italy—proved to be pivotal in my formation as a man. The church bells, ringing through my ears every hour, served as a constant reminder that, while completely on my "own" in the usual sense, I was never alone in the presence of God. The remembrance of those church bells never ceases to remind me of my duty to the Lord, and, God willing, in my mission to know Him more clearly, I shall be confirmed in the faith, and spared from eternal damnation.

**About The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)** The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is the process by which adults of other faith traditions, or of no faith tradition at all, come to join the Catholic church. We use the four pillars of the RCIA: teaching of doctrine, witness to the faith, participation in the OLPH community and participation in liturgy in order to make our journey together. The Rites of Christian Initiation occur during Lent and participants are received into the church at the Easter Vigil, in the spring.

### Q) How do I know if I already have an account set up?

If you do not have an account set up, you can easily create your own profile on the OLPH GiveCentral portal. Please see the instructions on the GiveCentral ad on this page.


### Q) Does it matter if I give from either my credit card or my checking account?

A) Yes, actually it costs the parish less if you give from your checking account. The parish is charged much higher fees for credit card transactions than those that are made from checking account withdrawals.
