Thoughts on the SUNDAY SCRIPTURES

In today's first reading we encounter the Holy Spirit who at Pentecost came rushing in over Jesus' followers like a powerful wind. It must have been a frightening experience for them. But their great acts of prophetic witness began when the Spirit drew them out of their "comfort zones."

Jesus said the Holy Spirit, like the wind, blows where it wills; into the lives of good stewards, empowering them to perform wondrous acts of healing, reconciliation and evangelization; encouraging them to proclaim the Gospel with boldness and confidence. All of that is a little beyond the comfort zone where most of us live our lives.

This week, reflect on how the Holy Spirit may be calling you out of your personal comfort zone.

Dear Parishioners,

"The Holy Spirit will teach you everything." Jn 14: 23

This weekend's celebration of Pentecost is the Feast of the Spirit. It was the descent of the Holy Spirit that marked the birth of the Church. Infused with the Spirit, the first disciples, courageously proclaimed the Good News of Jesus Christ. The Spirit animates our sense of mission.

Each year as we mark the Feast of Pentecost, we are invited to reflect on how the mission of the Church is being further enabled by the power of the Spirit.

Each year we invoke the Pentecost antiphon, "Come Holy Spirit".

On many levels, the mission of the Church yearns for the energy and renewed vitality that only the Holy Spirit can bring.

For much of the past year the larger mission of the Church has been diminished by the abuse scandal and the failure of bishops and others to address this travesty. Many bishops were implicated themselves in criminal behavior. In Bishop Barron's recent book, "Letter to a Suffering Church", he acknowledges many are tempted to leave, "But now is not the time to leave, it is the time to stay and fight". We need the power of cleansing and renewal that is always a gift of the Holy Spirit.

Come Holy Spirit

The mission of the Church is desperately needed in our society. Last week was a reminder how the witness of the Church to the sanctity of human life must find new energy and passion. In one of the darkest days of our state's history, legislation passed that removes almost any protection of an unborn child. Years ago, in his encyclical, "Evangelium Vitae", St John Paul II warned of the culture of death and its power to destroy life. With few exceptions there seemed to be no moral or ethical consideration to the implications of ending an unborn child's life even within moments of birth. Just around the corner will be profound moral consequences to the very process of conception itself, as genetic, stem cell and DNA research moves from the theoretical to the real. On the other end of the spectrum, more elderly and chronically ill patients will face the threat of removal of life supporting surgeries and medicines because someone has deemed them "not viable".

Come Holy Spirit

We will soon be entering a year of celebration and reflection on our mission as a parish community as we mark the 100th Anniversary of our founding. How active the Holy Spirit has been here in the past! How open we must be to the ongoing manifestation of the Holy Spirit in the present and in the future. The Spirit will lead us to be an even more vital and active faith community. I am sure there will be many graces as we ponder the mission of OLPH in the future. What new and lifegiving ministries will we be called to form? Who will the Spirit call to leadership and service? How will we become an even more "Spirit" driven faith community?



The Symbols of Our Parish: The Icon

As we begin to celebrate our Centennial year, we would like to explore some of the artistic and historic elements that are such an important part of OLPH Parish. We are surrounded by items of great beauty, deep meaning, and rich tradition. This week, let's take a closer look at The Icon.

The History

The legend is that this was the first icon ever made. St. Luke, who not only authored the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, but is also the patron saint of artists, was said to have painted it during Mary's lifetime and that she gave it a special blessing. It is more likely that Our Mother of Perpetual Help is a Byzantine icon, believed to have its origin sometime during the 13th -15th century.

The icon is painted on wood and measures about 20" in height. At various times the icon was in Crete, Rome and Paris. Today it is permanently enshrined in the Church of Saint Alphonsus Liguori in Rome. The icon is known for being miraculous; over the centuries countless healings and special graces have been attributed to it.

Father Edward J. Vattmann, at the time an Army Major at Fort Sheridan, provided a version of the painting of Our Lady of Perpetual Help to the newly built church in 1907, resulting in the naming of our parish in her honor when it was established as a permanent parish in 1919.

The Elements

Greek Characters

- **MP ΘY** = Mother of God.
- **O APM** = the Archangel Michael; to Mary's right
- **O AΠ I O** = the Archangel Gabriel; to Mary's left

Mary's Star

- Reminds us she is the dawn announcing the coming of Jesus.
- Symbolizes the role of Mary in the mystery of Christ and the Church.
- The star indicates that she is the one who will lead us to Christ.

Mary's Eyes

- Mary's eyes are filled with compassion and love, are fixed on us, her children on earth.
- She is our source of constant comfort and hope.
- Her eyes draw all who look into her face toward the mystery of Redemption which she holds in her arms.

Archangel Michael

- He is holding a lance, a pole with a sponge, and a vessel of vinegar.
- These prefigure scenes from Jesus' crucifixion.
- The Archangel's veiled hands inculcate reverence for holy things.

Archangel Gabriel

- He is holding a cross and nails, the very instruments of the coming death that has driven the boy Jesus to His mother's safe embrace.
- His veiled hands inculcate reverence for holy things.



Mary's Cloak

- The colors of Mary's cloak symbolize both her virginity (red) and motherhood (blue). These are also the colors of royalty.
- Blue is the color worn by mothers in Palestine, symbolic that Mary is both virgin and mother. Her red tunic underneath is the color worn by virgins during the time of Jesus.

Mary's Hands & Arms

- Mary's hands and arms hold Jesus in a manner that indicates she is presenting Him to us.
- Her right hand points directly into the heart of the Christ Child, up to the Cross the angel is holding.
- Her left hand position, along with the view of the right hand, is one of presenting the Child to those who stand before the icon as she says: "Receive the Word of God."



Evolve Adult Education Ministry

**"Splendors of the Vatican Museums" Tue., June 18, 7:00 - 8:30pm,
McDonnell Hall**

Art historian, Jeff Mishur, is returning with another enriching program featuring art from the Vatican museums that offers some tangible expressions of Church history. Jeff will examine objects from the Early Christian, Renaissance and Baroque periods that serve as tangible connections to Christianity as it evolved over the centuries. He will discuss how these works would have been read by contemporaries and will also focus on iconography and patronage. Some of the less familiar objects to be discussed include the 3rd-5th century Mandylion of Edessa-one of the oldest known depictions of Christ's face- as well as an 8th-9th century Annunciation on silk.

The majority of Jeff's presentation features works in the Vatican collections by Michaelangelo, Leonardo, Raphael and Caravaggio. The Vatican is a treasure house of religious and secular masterpieces; so in his hour long presentation Jeff touches on a selection of collection highlights. Come join us for a brief sojourn to Rome and one of the world's greatest art collections. Buon Viaggio!

Jeff Mishur is co-owner of Art Excursions, a company that provides private guiding in Chicago, lectures and boutique art and culture tours in the United States. A popular speaker about art historical and travel topics, Mishur has his M.A. in Art History from Northern Illinois University and has taught on the university level for many years

The Face of Jesus

- The Christ Child looks out beyond the instruments of His passion to our future redemption.
- While Jesus' body is that of a child, His face is more mature, symbolizing wisdom beyond His years.

Jesus' Hands

- The joining of his hands with his mother's signify the perfect conformity of Mary's will with Her Son's, and that together with Him, she participated in the work of the Redemption.

Jesus' Clothes

- His green tunic symbolizes His humanity and creation.
- The red sash around His waist symbolizes the Blood of Christ shed for our salvation.
- The gold cloak is symbolic of the Resurrection.
- Together, the colors of the garments are a statement of the Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection of Christ.

Mary's Face & Mouth

- The smallness of her mouth teaches us to be silent before the presence of God.

Jesus' Feet & Sandals

- The dangling sandal of the baby Jesus implies that he left to the comfort of Mother Mary in anticipation of the Passion. He went so quickly that he shed his sandal.

The Gold Background

- The gold background represents heaven and the divine light of the Resurrection shining through the garments of Jesus and Mary entering into the one praying before the image.

On Friday night, May 31, 2019, OLPH parishioners **Jen Farber, Frances Fiorentino, Donna Greco, Mary Maginot, Tricia McLeod, and Susan Sutehall** attended the "There is Hope for the Broken" event.

This event was inspired by Kevin Matthews, a longtime Chicago radio host who had a spiritual awakening after he stumbled across a broken Virgin Mary statue sitting next to a dumpster outside a flower shop.

Matthews gave his testimony at St. John Cantius Church. A 1.5 mile candlelight procession was then escorted by police along Chicago Ave. to Water Tower Place.

It was a night of prayer and reflection. The message was simple: Everyone is broken and in need of healing.



Eight years after finding the statue, Matthews' message continues to spread. On Friday night, there were thousands in attendance.


OLPH Book Club



What can I do to Help?

First of all, thank you to all who have helped our parish Youth Ministry. We are slowly but surely getting our young people involved in Youth Group. Youth Ministry is the responsibility of all at OLPH. The program we are developing must not be built around one person but with the whole community. We need your help! Two proposals for you to consider....

Prayer Partner

Be a hands-folded volunteer. One of the most important activities you can do for Youth Ministry is to pray regularly for the youth in our parish. We want to develop a list of folks who will commit to this. We would send text or email reminders of events coming up or special intentions to storm heaven about. Youth Ministry Adult Advisory and Support Team!

Be a hands-on volunteer. Meet with the Youth Ministry Adult Team three times a year to pray, brainstorm, plan, evaluate, set goals, establish priorities and celebrate! As a member of the team, help with one or two activities during the year. Your ministry would be a ministry of advice, encouragement and support for youth ministry and a presence with the young people who attend an event. The goal? All our Youth Group activities should include at least one other adult from the greater Church community.

Examples?

Attend a Food Faith and Fun activity (usually Saturday or Sunday evening) and meet the young folks and join in the activities planned for that meeting. Help plan and carry out an event. Volunteer to drive a group to a service activity. Pick up the pizza! Help shop for food for dinners and for the Brown Bag Lunch Projects. Cook dinner for Hilda's House Homeless Shelter. Join in a Scripture Study meeting. Attend Stations of the Cross with the teens. Help stuff envelopes for mailings. Be a chaperone for a Cubs, Sox or Blackhawks outing. Attend a Teen Mass. Supervise fun night activities in the Playdium. Go bowling. Participate in Habitat for Humanity. Attend an overnight high school retreat. Attend a Confirmation Retreat. Share your story and your faith on an informal basis. You have lots of opportunities.
