

### Thoughts on the SUNDAY SCRIPTURES

If we want to know what Jesus' parable is about in today's Gospel, it seems that we don't need to work too hard because Saint Luke tells us right at the beginning: "Jesus told his disciples a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart."

This parable has often been used to bring comfort to us about our prayer life. But could there be a more challenging message for those who take stewardship seriously? Widows were the poorest and most vulnerable of people in Jesus' time. Oppressive legal and economic structures were the norm.

Jesus embraced with great compassion the poor and the marginalized. Could it be that we are also encouraged to pray persistently for the poor, the weak and the vulnerable as we hear their cry for justice? And that we must not lose heart that we can effect change in their lives?

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend's passage from the Second Letter of St. Paul to Timothy is so reassuring in this time when many question, just about everything. We are surrounded by voices that seem to dismiss the very foundations of many of the institutions that are anchors, whether it is the Church, the government or our culture.

That being said, we are in a time of upheaval. Last weekend at the canonization of **St. John Newman** and four others, the **Holy Father** challenged us to be; "kindly lights amid the encircling gloom". St. John Newman was a convert from Anglicanism. As an upper class, scholar in British Society, he did the unthinkable when he was received into the Catholic Church. He saw a clarity in Catholic doctrine and ethics that he saw vanishing in British Society. The Pope quoted the Cardinal's writings, "The Christian has a deep, silent, hidden peace, which the world sees not".

Paul reminds us of how crucial it is to be faithful to what we have been formed by. This demands that we see our faith as a work in progress. We need to keep growing spiritually. We need to explore ways in which we can connect our faith and values to this age. Each generation poses new challenges as to how the Gospel is proclaimed and our Christian mission realized. Just as Jesus adapted Jewish traditions and sensitivities to his proclamation, we too must do that for our faith and Church to be vital, alive and transformative.

**Prince Charles** attended this canonization and as the future head of the Anglican Communion this was a gesture of immense ecumenical meaning. St. John Newman's canonization has become a great step forward in unity. Prince Charles reflected, that Newman's "fearless, honest example was needed today, as the world is marked by division and intolerance, for the manner in which, at his best, he could advocate without accusation, could disagree without disrespect and perhaps most of all, could see differences as places of encounter rather than exclusion."

We need more John Henry Newmans in the world! St. John Newman Pray for us!

So many marvelous things going on that St. John Newman would be delighted by, from Scripture Study to Religious Ed, to after school activities, to Youth Ministry, people are assuming the challenge of St. Paul, "remain faithful to what you have learned and believe."



## 100 Years of Gratitude

On Saturday, September 14th, 2019, Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church of Glenview, OLPH, held a special mass and reception honoring its 100th year as a mainstay of Catholicism and service to the Glenview community and beyond.

My sister, Patty Henry, and I grew up just two doors from OLPH, where we attended school and learned beginning then competitive swimming at the Playdium. Once old enough, we became lifeguards and worked upstairs in the roller rink, typically behind the fountain and occasionally passing out roller skates.

I now live a short distance from Glenview, and upon learning of this recognition, I knew I needed to attend.

Certain individuals seemed synonymous with the names OLPH and Playdium, and it wasn't long before a spontaneous flow of history began to bombard my thoughts.

I readily recalled the maintenance man, Sparky. He was a gentle soul and could be seen anywhere in this large complex with his tool belt on, hard at work.

Frank Siler taught beginning and competitive swimming at the Playdium. He had a voice that bellowed across the pool without effort. He was strict and commanded his classes with a driving desire to teach every student how to swim to the best of his or her ability. More important than the thrill of swimming, we learned about the value of discipline, hard work and perseverance. I still recall the day he pulled me aside during class. While the other students patiently waited, Mr. Siler worked with me until I finally got the proper rhythm of the butterfly stroke. That attention to detail led me to loving and competing in all four strokes.

When Mr. Siler retired, I was asked by him to take over his swim classes, which I did. After my third child was born, I turned that role over to my sister, which she thoroughly loved.

Lifeguarding at the Playdium was fun and frequently a great social hour. However, we all learned quickly to keep the fun under wraps, especially when the bald head of Mr. Cooper appeared in the window that overlooked the pool. He was a man of few words. His slow, methodical walk and mere presence resulted in all of us standing a bit taller or sitting a bit straighter.

The staff in the locker room seemed to come and go until two sisters started working there, Mary and Beth Ford. I was more than delighted to see that they are still parishioners and were volunteering at the reception following the celebratory mass.

I can't help but remember the roller rink when the word Playdium is mentioned. In the loft overlooking the skating floor, Ted, the organist, masterfully played the organ. On the wall to the side of the loft a large sign flashed directions to the skaters. Ted controlled it, and whenever a break in the music occurred we all peered up at the sign in anticipation for the next command.

When CLEAR FLOOR lit up the sign, everyone dutifully took a time out. SPECIAL indicated that those with a partner could skate specific dances such as the Fox Trot or Tango, as dictated by the songs Ted played. ALL SKATE was one we all enjoyed but

no more than the HOKEY POKEY which always brought a smile to everyone. The most unnerving direction given on the lit sign was COUPLES ONLY. It was a skate session that made many hearts go "pitter patter."

Whether it was lifeguarding at the pool, working behind the fountain, or enjoying an evening of skating, the scope of what we learned was more far-reaching than we could have imagined.

We learned about friendships and relationships. We learned about work and play. Mostly, we learned about ourselves as we developed life skills navigating within this community of friends, co-workers and patrons.

Back to present day, as I sat in church waiting for the celebratory mass to begin, I couldn't help but smile as I watched Sister Paulanne scurry around full of bountiful energy, greeting parishioners while making sure the final details for this magnificent mass were in order.

I recalled how, when I was in grammar school in the late Sixties, Sr. Paulanne kept a pace going that was second to none. She never seemed to tire, no matter the time of day or night. In her loving but no-nonsense way, if Sr. Paulanne was involved, you could rest assured all would run smoothly and on time. Nor would our schooling have been complete without the caring yet high standards of Sr. Marie, who had the natural ability to bring more out of us students than we even dreamed possible.

Sr. Paulanne was also active in preparations for my eighth-grade graduation. She was there for my wedding, and for the baptisms of my 3 children and their confirmations. And, Sr. Paulanne guided and supported me through the memorial service for my sister, Patty, and her 4-year-old son, Patrick, after having lost their lives in a commercial airplane crash on October 31, 1994. A plaque memorializing Patty and Patrick remains in the Playdium posted next to the cashier window just outside the pool area.

As the chimes sounded 5 times, indicating the start of mass, I watched as Sr. Paulanne drifted quietly into the background. In that one moment, I felt as if the past, the present, and the future had all come together.

These pleasant memories, along with reflections on more challenging times, occurred under the watchful and prayerful eyes of Pastor Father Dussman, Pastor Father McDonnell and Pastor Emeritus, Father Flavin.

And so it is that within the recesses of my heart, these once dormant memories resurfaced, to be greeted with warmth and gratitude. Much of what I learned and who I've become has been a direct result of the education and unwavering faith I acquired within the sanctuary of OLPH. I am forever blessed to have been a part of this congregation, as it continues to flourish and influence innumerable lives over its next 100 years.
