

Thoughts on the SUNDAY SCRIPTURES

There is something very powerful in the realization that the family Jesus was raised in had to work things out and deal with circumstances beyond their control. I hope that we can turn to the Holy Family to help us resolve struggles we are facing, and to praise God for the blessings he has bestowed upon us. I hold up to the Lord hurting and wounded families. May the prospect of healing and new life be bestowed upon any family in need.

So much of the ministry of our parish is centered on family. Families come in many forms, and in the end the family we share our life with profoundly shapes and influences us. Christmas time can be a time of cherishing those we love and supporting those in need of special support or encouragement.



We always had a lot of house guests around the holidays at my family home. My Mom would always tape the following on the refrigerator door: 'If you moved it, move it back, if you borrowed it, return it, if you broke it, own up to it, if you turned it on, turn it off, and my favorite: if it isn't any of your business, it isn't any of your business'!

Communion to the Homebound

Ministers of Care bring Holy Communion to those at home that are unable to come to church because of illness, advancing age or disability. This can be done on either a short-term basis or a long-term basis.

There are *Communion to the Homebound* cards that have instructions and contact information regarding this service. They are located at the entrance of the church or in the Baptistry room.

Dear Friends,

Yesterday, the Attorney General of Illinois released a preliminary report on her investigation of the Illinois Catholic dioceses' response to the child sexual abuse crisis.

We issued a response, which you can read [here](#), but it is important that I reach out to you, our coworkers in our mission, to offer reassurance that your archdiocese takes its responsibilities to victims of clergy abuse seriously and works diligently to protect children from harm.

As many of you know, the Archdiocese of Chicago has been at the forefront of dealing with the issue of clergy sexual abuse for nearly three decades. In 1991, Cardinal Bernardin called for a dramatic change in our culture and developed a set of policies and practices that keep children safe, hold offenders accountable and ensure we act with transparency. These policies, adopted in 1992, were the model for the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People approved by the United States bishops' conference a decade later.

You may be confident that everyone who has come to the Archdioceses of Chicago with an allegation has been treated with respect and offered pastoral care. We have reported all allegations of child sexual abuse to civil authorities and investigate every allegation against an archdiocesan priest, regardless of whether the accused is alive or dead. We have published the names of diocesan priests with substantiated allegations of child sexual abuse since 2006, a time when few dioceses made this information public.

For more information on the actions the Archdiocese of Chicago has taken to address this issue, resources for victim-survivors, instructions for reporting a sexual abuse allegation, frequently asked questions about our independent review of our policies, procedures and practices, and public statements made by me and other Church leaders, please visit our [Healing and Reconciliation website](#).

Once again, we mourn the grave damage done to the many people harmed by clergy sexual abuse and stand ready to cooperate with all institutions and agencies that care for children. It can never be stated often enough: No matter where a child is educated or cared for, they are all our children and deserve to be protected.

During this holy season, as we prepare for the coming of the Christ Child in our own hearts, let us continue to pray for all those harmed by abuse. Let us reflect the light of Christ for them and be messengers of His Good News to all we encounter.



Recycling Christmas

Christmas is a joyous time of year with festive decorations and packages. However, it can lead to a lot of additional waste and empty packaging. Cardboard and plastic can be recycled in your bins. Corrugated cardboard should be flattened. Paper coated with wax or foil cannot be recycled.



Recycle String Lights

Glenview residents can drop off holiday lights for recycling at the Public Works Department at the northeast corner of East Lake and Shermer through February 22, 2019. A marked receptacle will be placed outside the center at curbside for collection. All string lights and extension cords are accepted. Garland and live greens are not accepted.

The strands will be separated, baled, and sent to be chopped or shredded and sold as a commodity to US foundries and mills.

Styrofoam Packaging

The same properties that make polystyrene an excellent packaging material - its light weight, low cost and strength - make it difficult to recycle. The cost of trucking polystyrene to a recycling plant is cost-prohibitive and it has low scrap value. Because styrofoam food containers are usually contaminated, they require cleaning before they can be processed for recycling, another factor which makes recycling generally infeasible.

Also recycles most electronics, large appliances and small appliances (e.g., computers, hair dryers, microwaves, toasters, humidifiers), cardboard, batteries, and plastic packaging material. Please bring your recyclables to the Recycling Center, the freestanding building located just west of the main building. Abt does not accept glass, light bulbs including Christmas lights, cd/dvd/vhs tapes, and styrofoam peanuts.
