For many centuries they had no priests but encountered the faith through lay men and women who traveled to China to learn about Jesus Christ. Their faith was strong and despite persecution they grew by leaps and bounds. Pope Francis recently canonized over a hundred men and women martyrs who had given their lives for Christ. Just in the past few decades Catholics have gone from two to eleven percent of the total population and are baptizing, confirming, and catechizing thousands of men, women, and children every year. It is a good reminder to all of us that Christ's message is alive and well in today's world. Please pray for the growth of the Church in Korea.

Any time we turn on the news, we see how much our world needs prayer and the healing power of Jesus Christ. Today more than ever we must pray for persecuted Christians throughout the world, especially for the ancient Churches of Syria and Iraq who find themselves facing persecution and even extinction at the hands of Islamic extremists. We also must pray for the people of Ukraine, that peace and freedom might come to that troubled corner of Europe and that the dignity of all nations and peoples is respected by the international community. On a more positive note, we also want to pray for all of our children who have returned to school. May this be a year of growing in spirit and mind and may they come to know God's love for them.
